FROM THE RECTORY

Summer Update

As I write to you, it is July 16, a Sunday, but I am not at St. Michael's, but at Rock Point in Burlington for the weekend. The sun is shining over beautiful Lake Champlain and the only thing that keeps this place from being completely paradisiacal are the mosquitos, the largest and healthiest looking mosquitos I've ever seen! We are in between camps: Jonah just finished Jr. High Camp and both he and Nathaniel are starting Intermediate Camp this afternoon. I am grateful that St. Michael's is sending 13 kids to this magical place this summer participating in Jr. High, Intermediate and Elementary camps.

Rock Point was a gift to the Diocese of Vermont by the son of Vermont's first bishop, John Henry Hopkins, in 1854. As a brochure I found in the Bishop Booth Conference Center states, "In accepting this property, the diocese received a unique landscape characterized by cedar bluffs, meso-oak-hickory forests, and the finest visible example of the Champlain overthrust geological formation. The property has grown in environmental and historical importance, acquiring an abiding spiritual significance as the city of Burlington has grown up around it." Bishop Ely and the good people of the Episcopal Church in Vermont have done a great job creating a place that welcomes everyone, is a model of environmental stewardship, and preserves a sanctuary of creation for all to enjoy. I'm glad that so many of our children and youth have the opportunity to experience this sacred space!

I am also grateful for Duncan Hilton joining St. Michael's as our first ever Minister for Discernment and Disciple-ship. He began his time at St. Michael's only two weeks ago, but has jumped right into setting up his office, serving as a deacon in our Sunday worship and getting to know both parishioners and those in our community. We have spent many hours together sharing our own experience of discernment, faith and discipleship, our respective specialized training (his in faith-based community organizing and mine in missional church theology), and our shared appreciation of contemplative practices and prayer. In addition to sharing our own backgrounds and knowledge, we have been reading books and articles and researching resources that will inform this ministry.

It is important and interesting work and vital for us to be on the same page as we move forward into setting up a structure for a ministry of experimentation and innovation, a ministry in which we will need your gifts, discernment and participation. Stay tuned! And in the meantime, I hope you are enjoying a time of communion with God, with others and with creation during these beautiful summer months.

SPECIAL SUMMER FORUM, SUNDAY, AUGUST 6 REFUGEE DISLOCATION, FLIGHT AND MIGRATION IN AN INCREASINGLY UNWELCOMING WORLD

On August 6 from 9:00-10:00, Dr. Laura Hammond of the School of Oriental and African Studies (SOAS) at the University of London will present and lead a discussion on the above. Displacement has happened as a result of natural causes such as drought and demographic shifts, but also because of human created causes, such as civil wars, deforestation, famine, governmental neglect and oppression, racism, religious fundamentalism, intolerance and ethnic cleansing, genocidal policies and even climate change. Millions of people throughout the world from Latin America, the Middle East, Africa and Asia are uprooted and homeless; yet risking their very lives, they search our world for a home. Laura will speak of all this, but also of humane societies and countries where hope persists, of efforts within our international community to provide new homes at last, and of the young and old who do create new lives for themselves against all odds. Her experience is rooted in the Horn of Africa – particularly Ethiopia and Somalia – where she as worked for the past 25 years.

And yes, Laura is my daughter. It's a delight to have been asked by our parish Outreach Ministry Team to ask her to lead a discussion such as this when she is here from London next, and August it is. She is an anthropologist and professor of international development, and she teaches and works with everyone from refugees to religious communities to governments on these very issues. She's also a runner, a mom who's the biggest fan of her 12-year old son's rock and roll guitar playing, her 8-year old son's endless questions, and her British husband's love of pasties, bangers and mash. DEACON'S UPDATE

Greetings from my church office, formerly Mary's office, next door to the library. Mary and the staff have been incredibly helpful setting me up with a desk, computer, and telephone (It's the first time I've had a landline telephone since 2002!). That said, these first few weeks have been such a delightful flurry of meetings, worship, and sermon-writing that I haven't yet had time to unpack my boxes of books or decorate the bare white walls. Meetings have been with staff, parishioners, and community members ranging in subjects from the choice of a diocesan health insurance plan, to one-to-one discernment conversations, to where the grape juice chalice goes on the communion table, to beginning to develop a strategy and structure for my ministry here. When I notice my-self impatient or overwhelmed, I sense God's wisdom and presence in the words of Pierre Teilhard de Chardin* to "Above all, trust in the slow work of God." I'm looking forward to the remaining summer weeks as a time to continue to meet one-to-one with members of the parish and folks in the community in order to slowly discern God's slow work in their lives and in this town, and hopefully to even unpack those boxes of books.

STANDING WITH THE LOCAL LOVE BRIGADE -- AN UPDATE


A number of parishioners, old and young and very young, have been standing with the Local Love Brigade to send handmade postcards to support victims of hatred. So far, we have sent 178 of them. Since the postcards are often minimally signed, or not signed at all, it's a wonder that some of their recipients have managed to respond to the Local Love Brigade.

One of the first to do so was Temple De Hirsch in Seattle: "After we found hateful graffiti on the walls of our old sanctuary, it was hard to keep our spirits up. But soon postcards and notes started arriving from Brattleboro, Vermont: first a trickle, and then a paper tsunami of warm and loving greetings. At the risk of sounding trite, our spirits lifted (especially when we saw the child-drawn hearts and words.)... It made a palpable difference to us and to our community to have received such warm and loving communications from you and your group. Please extend our heartfelt thanks and friendship to one and all."

When Romulo Avelica Gonzalez was detained by ICE as he dropped off his children at the Los Angeles-based charter school Academia Avance, the Local Love Brigade sent postcards. The educator who received the postcards to pass on to the family later wrote, "Thank you all so much for these postcards! The school staff and family received all of your messages with awe and joy and plenty of joyful tears for the support. This has been a really crazy experience as an educator, and the family is so moved by all of the support from everyone!" The whole school community was

so moved that, when 37 graduating seniors and their chaperones came East to a science conference in upstate NY, they also made a side trip to Brattleboro to make postcards to support others.

And last week, one member of the Local Love Brigade received the following letter from the mother of 23-year-old Taliesin Myrddin Namkai Meche, who was one of two men murdered while defending two young women from the harassment of a white supremacist in Portland, Oregon. Some of the postcards she mentions originated from St. Michael's – and one was drawn by our youngest postcard-artist.



As Martin Luther King said, "Darkness cannot drive out darkness: only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate: only love can do that." And our postcards help.

FROM THE LIBRARY SHELVES

"In the Steps of St. Paul" by H. V. Morton published by Dodd, Mead & Company, New York 1936 5 ½ x 8 inches, 499 pages

H. V. Morton was the premier travel writer of his day. Curious as to how the lands that Paul had visited twenty centuries previous had survived and changed, he set out in the steps of the saint to follow his travels. Morton's route included the Holy Land, Syria (including today's poor blasted Aleppo), Turkey, Greece, Cyprus, and Rome. His travels were complicated by the partition following World War I: France controlled Syria and England controlled Palestine. Furthermore, primitive Turkey had become modernized under Ataturk, Athens was then an inconsequential backwater, and Cyprus was still primitive. The great harbor of Antioch had disappeared to silt and Ephesus became a nesting place for storks.

Paul's epistles are the oldest Christian documents. He was contemporary with Jesus. Although he never saw him, he had encountered those who had claimed to have both seen the crucifixion and the resurrection. Not all the epistles attributed to Paul are considered authentic, a subject of scholarly dispute.

When Rome controlled the lands of Paul's travels, these lands were advanced and prosperous unlike the squalid remnants Morton encountered in his travels, the consequence of changing trade routes and earthquakes. Then the cities were built in the Roman manner, laid out in the typical Roman grid, had running water and decent sanitation, and had superb paved roads all of which led to Rome. It was over these roads that St. Paul, a Roman citizen as well as a Jew, journeyed.

Travelling from port to port by coastal ships, Morton saw from shipboard the world just as St. Paul had seen it. By train and motor, however, the former Pauline world that Morton encountered was a crumbling shambles. The glory that was Rome had sunk in the mud of indifference and incompetence. But Morton is a charming travelling companion despite the adversities endured, and, though no Biblical scholar, well-read and informed about the saint. His account is a delight.

Virtually nothing of Paul's world remains as he knew it. But the market place in Athens that he would have known intimately has been long excavated and restored. Here, like this reviewer, he had trod its stone flaggings.
