FROM THE RECTORY

This year, on January 6, the Feast of the Epiphany, St. Michael's will be hosting a very special event – the Ordination of a Priest, Duncan Hilton. For this ordination, we will host two bishops, the Right Reverend Alan M. Gates, Bishop of Massachusetts, and the Right Reverend Thomas C. Ely, Bishop of Vermont. The Reverend Tom Kinder, a UCC minister in Stratford, Vermont and a longtime friend and mentor of Duncan's, will be the preacher.

As wonderful as it will be to host these special guests in our church and as important as it is for us to support Duncan in his vocation, ordinations are not so much about bishops or special guests or even about Duncan himself. Ordinations are really about God - Creator, Son and Holy Spirit - and the amazing things God does in our lives - calling us to many different ministries, some ordained, some not, but wherever God is the agent of the calling, all holy callings.

So I invite you to come to church on Saturday, January 6 at 10:30 am, the Feast of the Epiphany. Come and celebrate what God is doing in Duncan's life and in our own lives and invite the Holy Spirit to continue to lead and guide us. I guarantee that you will be inspired and your faith will be strengthened and your loyalties confirmed.



DEVELOPMENTS FROM THE MINISTER OF DISCIPLESHIP AND DISCERNMENT



Dear St Michael's,

It has been a full month with the discernment and discipleship ministry. More than 20 people attended the discernment workshop on Saturday December 2, the six small groups continue to meet, the leadership team initiated an Advent compline service with the help of Valerie Abrahamsen as cantor, and we've been preparing for the ordination service on January 6. Here are answers to a few questions folks have asked:

Will your job at St Michael's change after ordination?

"No" is the short answer. My job description remains the same, working part-time at St Michael's while also teaching at CCV in the afternoons. I'll be able to preside at the Eucharist, of course, but I'll still be alternating weeks between attending the 8 am and 10:15 am services on Sundays. That said, as a new ministry the focus of my work will likely continue to evolve but that will be because of the Spirit's leading and not because of my ordination.

What then is your focus for the winter?

The discipleship groups will continue to meet through early January and then all the participants will gather at the Church on the evening of Wednesday, January 24 to reflect on their experience and to discuss continuing with the groups. We'll eat, pray, share our reflections across groups, and plan how to move forward with the small groups. It may be that some groups continue meeting as they are currently configured, others may end, and others may open to new

members. We'll also discuss possible changes to the small group format. At the February 11 Adult Forum, members from the small groups can share their experiences with the wider congregation. In that Forum, we may also discuss how to move forward with the more missional, outward-focused efforts of the ministry.

What does the Centering Prayer and Welcoming Practice Retreat on January 19-20 have to do with all of this?

Prayer is one of the spiritual disciplines that participants have been trying on more deeply in the discipleship groups. We wanted to offer further teaching and practice space for those who want to practice silent prayer in the Christian tradition. This retreat is a chance to receive a teaching from Fr. Bill Sheehan, a nationally acclaimed teacher and also a former priest at St Michael's Catholic Church in Brattleboro.

CHARLES MAYS, JR. SPEAKS ON MARTIN LUTHER KING SUNDAY, JANUARY 14

Charles Mays, Jr. will lead the Forum and preach on January 14 at the 10:15 Martin Luther King service. In anticipation of his visit with us the Social Justice Committee asked Mr. Mays several questions:

- "What does a black man have to say to a predominantly white congregation on MLK Sunday?"
- "What can white allies offer African Americans?"
 and
- "Do you see signs of hope?"

When he accepted the invitation to spend the morning with us, Mr. Mays wrote: "I will hope I can offer something to challenge and inspire the congregation to introspection resulting in outward action."

Mr. Mays was brought up and nurtured in the Southern Baptist tradition of singing and piano playing, going on to study voice, leading finally to doctoral studies at the Hartt School of Music, where his dissertation topic was the Middle Passage development of the spiritual. His ties to the Brattleboro community began when he was invited to be a participant at the Marlboro Music Festival, where he was in residence for 3 seasons. He was selected to be a touring member of Marlboro Festival. Following that, Charles won the Metropolitan Opera Young Artist Award. He has appeared as soloist with countless choruses and orchestras, but his particular tie to the Brattleboro Community comes through his association and friendship with Susan Dedell, with whom he has worked musically for over 15 years. Charles has a passion for sharing the history of black music in America, and frequently does presentations, master classes, and workshops in schools. He currently lives in New Haven, CT with his partner, Patrick.

Bishop Ely Announces His Retirement

The Right Reverend Thomas C. Ely, tenth bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Vermont, recently announced his intention to retire and resign his ministry, no later than September 30, 2019. He has agreed to remain in his position until a successor is chosen and is in place.

Ely, 65, was consecrated as bishop of the Vermont diocese in 2001, having previously served as a priest in the Diocese of Connecticut for 20 years. In a message to the people of the Diocese of Vermont, Ely said that by the time of his retirement he will have served in the priest-hood for nearly 39 years.

"There are other interests and ministries to which I am feeling called to devote my time and energy while my health and stamina are still good," Ely said, "including family, community theatre, various justice ministries and a bit more golf."

During his episcopate, Ely has been a leader both within the diocese and throughout the wider Episcopal Church on such controversial issues as marriage equality, the ordination of LGBT clergy, increased gun safety and racial justice. He is also a leading voice on matters of environmental and economic justice.

JANUARY FORUMS

January 7: "The New American Bible"

The first American Bible of 1663 is the most ambitious publishing project ever attempted in this country and, possibly, the most ambitious ever attempted in the history of Christian publishing. For sheer audacity, nothing matches it. The Luther-inspired translating and printing of the Bible from the Latin into the common spoken languages one hundred and fifty years previous compares rather poorly. This 1663 Bible is considered the second most valuable American book. The 1640 Bay Psalm Book is the first because of scarcity and recently sold at auction for fourteen and a half million dollars. Bob Anderson leads.

January 14, Martin Luther King Sunday: "A Black Man Looking at Life."

Charles Mays, the 10:15 am Martin Luther King Sunday preacher, will lead the Forum discussion about what it is like growing up as an African-American in today's polarized nation. Mr. Mays was brought up in the South in the Baptist tradition. He committed himself to an intense study of vocal music, leading to winning the Metropolitan Opera Young Artist Award. Charles has sung at the Marlboro Festival, at the Brattleboro Concert Choir and around the nation. He has a passion for the performance and development of black music.

January 21: Centering Prayer: A History and a Conversation about Current Organizational Trends

Join Father Bill Sheehan and others to talk about how Centering Prayer and Christian Meditation were rediscovered in the Christian Tradition and what organizations have been created to support these practices, such as Contemplative Outreach International, The World Community for Christian Meditation, Wisdom School and Northeast Wisdom.

January 28: "Voices from Inside"

The January 28 Forum is an inspiring presentation by women from Voices from inside (VFI) – a creative writing program that supports women in the Springfield-Greenfield area who are or have been incarcerated, or who are recovering from addiction. Since 1999 VFI has been making a difference in the lives of incarcerated women by giving them the opportunity to find their voices through writing, the power to imagine new possibilities for themselves, and the ability to return to their communities with success. Sharing their stories with the public through performances and readings is an important aspect of VFI's mission. Come listen as each story is told through the unique viewpoint and voice of the writer. A time for questions and interaction with participants will be given at the end of the presentation. In this season of Epiphany we are thankful for the women and the work of Voices from Inside, which truly serves as a light shining in the darkness of our times, and we are honored to host them at St. Michael's. Chris Triebert leads.

FROM THE LIBRARY SHELVES

A Common Life: The Wedding Story by Jan Karon Viking New York 2001 6"x9" 186 pages

"Depend upon it (Watson), there is nothing so unnatural as the commonplace....This is the Dundas separation case.... The husband was a teetotaler, there was no other woman, and the conduct complained of was that he drifted into the habit of winding up every meal by taking out his false teeth and hurling them at his wife,"

[Sherlock Holmes quoted in "A Case of Identity"].

In this vale of toil and strife, there is something comforting about the commonplace (less the flying choppers) in which people of goodwill contest life's daily vicissitudes with good humor and charity for all. This is the sixth volume of a series about Father Tim Kavanagh, the balding, diabetic, elderly bachelor vicar who ministers to the Episcopal congregation of Lord's Chapel in Mitford, North Carolina. Mitford, not to be confused with Mayberry, appears to be proximate to Brattleboro in size.

From volume one romance rears its ugly head and this theme follows through succeeding volumes until the publication of this title when the poor vicar is finally worn down, abruptly loses the last vestige of self-control and reason, and hysterically proposes marriage to his long patient parishioner and next door neighbor Cynthia Coppersmith who has had a five volume crush upon him. Overlooking the rector's histrionics that would make a lesser woman quail, she accepts. The convolutions and intrigues of wedding planning constitute the plot and everyone lives happily ever after. There is, of course and mercifully, no sex prior to the wedding night (what, if anything, occurs thereafter is anybody's guess).

In Kingsley Amis' hilarious post-war novel of English academia "Lucky Jim," the long suffering and much maligned main character Jim Dixon in exasperation philosophically concludes, "Nice things are nicer than nasty ones." That also could be said of Jan Karon's charming stories which steer just clear of sappy.

Although her books fit the book publisher's category "Books for Old Ladies," the characters are believable, the situations plausible, and the dialogue rings true. The publisher in previous volumes kindly added a map of downtown Mitford so the reader might follow the comings and goings of the faithful and the friendly (for there are no indifferent, uncaring, or hostile characters). And, apparently feeling magnanimous, the publisher Viking paid for both an illustrator and a second text color for this attractive volume.

The aspiring reader should begin with the first volume "At Home in Mitford" and proceed through the successive volumes in order. Our library shelf contains fifteen! The author, though not prolix, is fecund.

Although some might suspect the corn is as high as an elephant's eye, other more contemplative and reflective souls, given to bouts of day-dreaming and wanting relief from this troublous world that daily besets us and the neurotic introspection that too commonly constitutes contemporary fiction and poetry, could do far worse than to escape to placid Mitford and the kindly folk therein. Mark Twain noted that man is the only animal that blushes—or needs to. It appears that there is little need to blush in Mitford.






Introduction to Contemplative Prayer: Centering Prayer and Welcoming Prayer

These methods of Christian prayer and meditation are contemporary forms that have been developed from ancient Christian traditions by Trappist monk Fr. Thomas Keating in order to "experience God's presence within us, closer than breathing, closer than thinking, closer than consciousness itself."





Fr. Bill Sheehan, OMI will lead the retreat. He is an experienced and beloved retreat director. Fr. Bill has been involved with Contemplative Outreach since 1983 and continues to serve the Centering Prayer communities. He has a rich background as a Pastor and Director of Ministry to Priests. A nationally renowned retreat leader, he served as a priest at St Michael's Catholic Church in Brattleboro in the late 1970's.
