Not only was it warm, but it was brighter and closer to Jeanie's office and the copy machine. I decided that it might be time to move offices. But then it got warmer and I put it off—until Jeanie started packing books. I can take a hint.

With Joel's books cleared, I started to go through my books, moving the ones I wanted to hold on to and adding to the collection of boxes of books we have from Joel. This meant that we needed a new home for all these books: hence the idea to start shuffling around in St. Michael's Library. Janet Cramer (Senior Warden) and I have begun to go through St. Michael's library, removing some of the books that are not current or classic or, in my humble opinion, particularly interesting so that we can bring our library upto-date and find a new home for all the extra books we now have in our possession. We hope that this means that St. Michael's library will not just be a lovely room for meetings, but an *actual* library that people in our congregation use for their Christian formation and spiritual edification.

My old office (down the hall in the Bradley Wing) will become the Parish Ministries Office, available for various parish ministries to use, such as the Pastoral Care Team, Education for Ministry, and the Outreach Team.

Soon we will announce a grand book give-away at St. Michael's, where you can come and peruse the books that did not make the cut. We will thank you for taking these books off our hands, but I warn you, this may cause you to start a summer shuffle of your own!

EFM BEGINS AGAIN IN SEPTEMBER

We are often faced with the difficult and subtle task of interpreting the richness of our faith in an increasingly complex and confusing world. At the end of the Eucharist we pray, "And now, Father, send us out to do the work you have given us to do, to love and serve

you as faithful witnesses of Christ our Lord." But how do we do this in today's world?

The group is the core of EfM. We read, and then through discussion we deepen our understanding of what we have read. We develop skills in theological reflection with the goal of learning to think theologically. By examining our own beliefs and their relationship to today's culture and the tradition of our faith, we learn that everything we do has potential for manifesting the love of Christ, and we discover that the opportunity for ministry is at hand wherever we turn.

PARISH FINANCIAL UPDATE: OPERATING INCOME/EXPENSES FOR JANUARY-JUNE

Total Pledges Received: \$113,304 vs. Budget of \$107,939 (105% of Budget)

of which: Total Pledges Received in June: \$12,898 vs. Budget of \$17,990 (72%)

This is the percent of pledge dollars received for the month compared to what we expected in the budget. A figure below 100% means we didn't meet the budget amount needed for that month.

Total Operating Income: \$176,617 vs. Budget of \$162,832 (109% of Budget)

This includes rental income, fund raising (including pledges), memorial gifts, altar guild flower income, hospitality, tag sale, and other miscellaneous income.

Total Operating Expenses: \$166,534 vs. Budget of \$166,961 (100%)

This is the dollars needed to run the church, such as salaries, utilities, repaying our building loan from the

Diocese, outreach, rectory expenses, administrative expenses, mission and ministry, worship and music, congregation development, grounds upkeep, and snow removal.



JULY VESTRY REPORT

The Vestry met for its July meeting on the 16th. Some highlights include:

- In his monthly update, Treasurer Wayne Cook reminded us that with summer comes a usual drop in pledges but the bills for lights, phones, and other expenses continue even when you are not in church! An easy way to pay your pledge is electronically, and help is available to set that up if you are unsure how to proceed.
- We had a short discussion on a chapter in the book we are reading, The Agile Church, led by Deb Jones and Sarah Benton.
- The Vestry also heard a report from our newly formed Fire and Safety Committee about a specific fire drill protocol which will continue to be tweaked and revised so that everyone is more aware of what to do in the event of a fire.
- We discussed upcoming events such as the parish picnic [see the article elsewhere in the *Guardian*] and various fall events, including a chant workshop to be held in November.
- Mary gave a wrap-up of the small group conversations, especially the suggestions participants had for the Vestry.
- We heard an update about the Healing Team ministry training from Janet Cramer.
- Deb Jones shared an update from the Buildings and Grounds committee regarding fixing the cracks in our parking areas.

Members of St. Michael's are encouraged to attend our monthly Vestry meetings, as they are open to everyone. It is a fun and interesting group and you can learn a lot about the ins and outs of church business! We meet every third Thursday in the Meeting Room at 6:00 p.m. Our next meeting will be August 21.

UPDATE FROM TIMES SQUARE

The midsummer heat has descended on Manhattan, and the tourists are here in their hordes. A surprising number of them end up coming through the doors of St. Mary the Virgin, the Episcopal parish church of Times Square and our church home in the big city. Virtually everyone is



pleasantly surprised to find in the middle of one of the busiest places on earth a lofty, quiet space filled with beauty and looking every inch the medieval church. The marble high altar reaches far above our heads, and glistening lamps burn signifying the presence of the Body and Blood of our Lord. What is this church doing here?

As we have discovered, quite a lot! Founded in the so-called Anglo-Catholic tradition, it takes seriously the two cornerstones of that Anglican movement: worship and service. St. Mary's has 26 services a week, including the full Daily Office mornings and evenings. It is very "high" in liturgy (the church's longtime nickname is "Smokey Mary's" because of all the incense used), and every feast is celebrated with all the trimmings. It is the kind of place one would expect to be stuffy, out of touch, and cold. But it's not. The doors of St. Mary's have been open every day since the church was founded in the 1870s, and it works hard to serve the huge variety of people around Times Square, from the homeless to investment bankers. People sleep or simply rest in the pews. Food

is given out. Counseling and assistance are available from the Sisters of St. John the Baptist in residence in the Mission House. The church is one of the biggest fundraisers for the annual New York AIDS Walk and has a big delegation in the Pride Parade. And always there is worship. We have learned you never know

whom God will bring. At the Vigil Mass last Saturday evening, a tourist from Brazil sat in front of us. She didn't speak English but beamed the whole time just to be there for the Eucharist. One of the most faithful parishioners is a homeless woman who wheels her cart up the aisle for Communion every Sunday.

Worship and service. Remind you of anywhere else? Despite the obvious differences on the surface, St. Mary's reminds us of St. Michael's a lot. And so we feel at home. In fact, we feel especially at home now because Zachary has opened his icon studio at the church, refurbishing an unused room in the rambling Mission House. He is honored to be a part of this special place and to add a new dimension to its ministries.

Please keep St. Mary's and its work in your prayers. Many of you come to New York from time to time. If you do, please let us know. We would love to introduce you to St. Mary's.
