Awakening to the Sacred in Daily Life Hallelujah Farm, Chesterfield, New Hampshire

This is the first time in recent history that St. Michael's has offered a women's retreat. The idea arose out of a desire of many of us to deepen our relationships with the women at St. Michael's in a prayerful and spacious setting where we weren't "doing" but just "being" together. We have planned the retreat around the theme of "Awakening to the Sacred in Daily Life." To this end, we will explore questions about ways of approaching our daily life and work with an awareness of God's presence in the midst of all we do. Between more focused times of learning, there will be time for rest, conversation, hiking, eating, and basking in the warmth of the fireplace.

PARISH FINANCIAL UPDATE: OPERATING INCOME/EXPENSES FOR JANUARY—NOVEMBER

Total Pledges Received: \$205,307 vs. Budget of \$197,888 (104% of Budget)

of which: Total Pledges Received in November: \$15,142 vs. Budget of \$17,990 (84%)

This is the amount of income from pledges alone that we have received. The first line shows the amount so far this year; the second line shows the amount for just the month noted.

Total Operating Income: \$308,379 vs. Budget of \$298,524 (103% of Budget)

This includes rental income, fund raising (including pledges), memorial gifts, altar guild flower income, hospitality, tag sale, and other miscellaneous income.

Total Operating Expenses: \$299,992 vs. Budget of \$301,442 (100%)

This is the dollars needed to run the church, including salaries, utilities, repaying our building loan from the Diocese, outreach, rectory expenses, administrative expenses, mission and ministry, worship and music, congregation development, grounds upkeep, and snow removal.



NOVEMBER VESTRY REPORT

We began the meeting with a discussion about our feelings surrounding the recent terrorist attacks. Following that, we had a presentation and discussion regarding the state of the roof of the church as part of the development of a five-year plan for building maintenance. We learned that some repairs to the roof have been made but more are needed.

The Treasurer's report followed. Essentially pledges are down and expenses are up. A plea was made for more young people to help with the tag sale.

The Rector's report followed with discussion of stewardship, the missional conversation group, the Diocesan convention, Black Lives Matter, and the newcomer's tea.

Questions were discussed regarding new financing for

the prison ministry and justice and refugees on the run.

The hopeful beginning of a men's breakfast group was brought up. Plans are to get started in January 2016.

The Building & Grounds Committee reported they had a good clean-up day and the new red maple was successfully planted.

Lastly, discussion was carried out regarding new vestry candidates.

From the Outreach Committee

Bearing in mind Joel Hill's philosophy of "giving from our abundance," the Outreach Committee has requested that the Vestry consider a form of parish tithing: that for 2016, 10% of the total amount of pledges be allocated to parish outreach. We shall maintain our policy of disbursing the Vestry allocation

equally across three areas: international, national, and local. We hope and pray that the Finance Committee and the Vestry can accede to this request. Although we still count on 50% of the proceeds of the two annual Tag Sales, as well as proceeds from occasional fundraising efforts, the amount at our disposal is never enough to fulfill every need. Consequently, we have committed to the policy that funds will be disbursed according to priorities of heat/shelter, food insecurity, and health. We shall also strive to keep parishioners better informed about our activities via regular announcements in the *Guardian* and the bulletins.

STEWARDSHIP UPDATE: WE DID IT!

A huge Thank You to all who have contributed to the 2016 Stewardship Campaign! In October, we set a stretch goal of raising \$225,000 and receiving 125 pledges. On December 9, we met both of our goals! We have received 125 pledges for a total of \$227,264. About 50% of the pledges were increased from last year, and we received 12 new pledges. Meeting our pledge goal allows St. Michael's to fund the current ministries of our church. Surpassing our goal will allow St. Michael's to depend less on its endowment draw (which was 5%) in 2015 to save more for St. Michael's future *and* give St. Michael's the means to grow new ministries. We are so grateful for your generosity and your support.

TRINITY INSTITUTE: LISTEN FOR A CHANGE

An annual theological conference, simulcast at St. Michael's January 22–23

Racial justice is a matter of life or death; we can't afford to stay silent and tacitly accept the (mostly) invisible systems that support inequalities, create suffering, and deny human dignity. Rather, we need to have an open dialogue—a process that starts with listening.

Trinity Institute 2016 (TI2016) recognizes that many of us avoid conversations about race because they're difficult, uncomfortable, or could risk being perceived as prejudiced. The conversations in TI2016 will be learning opportunities: chances to talk skillfully in theological reflection groups about charged issues with people who might have differing perspectives, with less apprehension. These life-giving conversations will teach us more about the racial issues of our time, including structural racism, mass incarceration, and policy change.

In the words of theologian Gustavo Gutièrrez, "All injustice is a breach with God." TI2016 brings action-oriented theologians and thought leaders together to provide better understanding, inspiration, and ideas you can use in your community to make a positive impact.

St. Michael's will be a hosting partner for TI2016. We will be webcasting the conference in the Meeting Room. You are welcome to attend one session or the entire conference. The schedule is below.

JANUARY 22

9:30 a.m.

Session 1: What Is Race, Anyway?

Science tells us that race has no basis in biology or genetics. So is race real? Surveys show how racist attitudes that were widespread 50 years ago are swiftly disappearing. So how can our society be racist? And why did it cause such a stir when a university offered a class on "The Problem of Whiteness"? TI2016's distinguished speakers will bring a sharp focus on what we talk about when we talk about race. Speakers include Nicholas Kristof (New York Times Columnist), Emilie Townes (Vanderbilt Divinity School) and Eduardo Bonilla-Silva (Duke University).

2:00 p.m.

Session 2: A People's History of Race

Even as we make strides toward overcoming racism in individuals, we need to take a closer look at the way our society's systems developed to perpetuate inequality. Insightful performance and probing conversation will help to ensure that when we talk about the future, we are conscious of a past that still clings to the present. Speakers include Emilie Townes (Vanderbilt Divinity School), Gary Dorrien (Union Theological Seminary), Janine Tinsley-Roe, T. James Kodera (Wellesley College).

January 23

9:30 a.m.

Session 3: Soul Searching in a Culture of Control

As Michelle Alexander argues in *The New Jim Crow*, "our prison system is a unique form of social control, much like slavery and Jim Crow, the systems it has replaced." Churches are waking up in great numbers to the importance of challenging this systemic injustice. Other speakers include Victor Rios (University of California) and Kelly Brown Douglas (Goucher University).

Session 4: Listen for a Change

Featuring Anna Deavere Smith "Standing Shoulder to Shoulder"

3:30 p.m.

Session 5: What Can We Do Together?

Following up on the presentations and small group work, participants will reflect on what they've heard in the past few days in order to discern the implications for action, both in our local contexts and through larger partnerships. Trinity's Rector and senior leadership will speak about Trinity's commitments and invite partnerships.

EXPLORING OUR FAITH TOGETHER

ADULT FORUMS FOR JANUARY

January 3, "A Year Into Our Prison Ministry"—A year ago this past October Rabbi Jim Levinson and I were asked if we would like to try out leading worship for the inmates at Southern State Correctional Facility in Springfield, Vermont. As friends and as strong believers in a deep level of mutuality within the Abrahamic tradition for Christians, Muslims, and Jews, we decided to dive in and and see what might happen. We were both amazed, almost transformed, by what happened. We have been leading worship at this prison each month ever since. Everyone is welcome, and regularly we are joined by Christians, Jews, Muslims, and questioning unbelievers. We have gone deeper, and now meet with inmates individually, and when we can get permission, host special celebrations such as Bar Mitzvahs, a Seder, a Christmas Carol sing, and special Eucharists, as we did in August with our own rector, Mary. We also work in our community to support released prisoners and their families. Opportunities open up very slowly within this tightly controlled prison system; however, members of our parish are able to join in this ministry. Come hear more, how you might join us, and why this may well be growing into a true ministry of our parish. Led by Craig Hammond.

January 10 and 17, Exploring Biblical Literacy as Opposed to Biblical Literalism—Join us for a two-part educational program that will explore Biblical literacy as opposed to Biblical literalism. Using a case study on the use of scripture to support slavery in the 1800s, we will explore how the Bible has been and is still used to oppress people. Participants will be asked to grapple with scriptural passages about slavery, homosexuality, and same-gender relationships. Join the Reverend Thad Bennett for either session as he leads us in a discussion about how to "take back the Bible" from fundamentalist and literalist interpretations.
