THE LITURGY OF DAILY LIFE

Today, I picked up Jonah, Nathaniel, and Bibi from school around 11:30 a.m. It was a half-day because it was the last day of school. The children had spent the day cleaning their classrooms, reminiscing about the school year that was ending, and saying good-bye. Although the kids were excited for summer vacation and the accomplishment of having completed their respective grades, Nathaniel started crying while saying good-bye to his second grade teacher. He knew that the friends and the teacher whom he'd grown to love would no longer be together in the same way and he was sad.

It just so happened that I was celebrating the noon Eucharist at St. Michael's that day. So I rushed back home with the kids, got on my robe and entered the chapel full of familiar faces. I announced that there was no saint appointed for that day, but that, in the more secular seasons of daily life, it was the Last Day of School.

Perhaps it was the juxtaposition of picking up my children and praying in the chapel, but it seemed to me at that moment that this day was a sacred day, a day to be recognized and given thanks for. I was grateful for the teachers and administrators who had cared for and loved my children over this last year, I was thankful for the friendships they had made and all that they had learned. And I was cognizant that this moment was unique and precious and fleeting. All this I wanted to bring to my prayers that day.

When we celebrate the different liturgical seasons and the prayers for morning, noontime, and evening in the church, we recognize the sacredness of time. We stop to notice the beauty of the morning, or the sense of longing in the season of Advent, and in these moments we notice and cherish the presence of God in our midst.

There is no reason why the significant moments of our daily, more secular lives might not be cherished in the same way. God is no less present in the Last Day of School than in the holy days of the Church year.

How would our daily lives be different if we truly were able to acknowledge this sacredness at all time and in all places?



How is the Church Funded?

Recently a person new to St. Michael's asked our Rector about how the church is funded. While we usually assume that people who come through our doors understand this aspect of the church's life and work, it is often an area of confusion. The Stewardship Committee offers here a basic explanation of how the church is supported financially.

St. Michael's operates almost entirely on contributions from parishioners. The majority of these monies come as annual pledges, which can be paid weekly, monthly, quarterly, or annually. To meet their pledges, folks use cash, checks, securities, or regular payments set up with banks that can sent by check, credit card, or electronic transfer. These operating funds are used to pay salaries, maintain the buildings, and support parish ministries, including Parish Wellness and Outreach, which touch the lives of people of St. Michael's and of the larger community in which we live. Additionally, groups at St. Michael's contribute through fundraising activities such as the semi-annual tag sales and the preparation of proposals for outside funding for programs such as The Choir School.

St. Michael's has a yearly campaign to raise funds to support the programs, activities, and ministries of the church. It's called our Stewardship Campaign. Usually in the fall we take four to six weeks to focus on our faith at work through the church and its ministries and to ask people to make a financial commitment to St. Michael's for the coming year.

Parishioner Chris Hart reflects on her own decisionmaking regarding her pledge: "I find that some years my focus is outward and I look to all the work we do locally, nationally, and internationally as a community of faith. Other years, my focus is inward and I look to all that this community and faith mean to me. How you have blessed and supported me and the huge impact following my faith has had on my life. Both are always present when I am sitting considering my pledge."

Monies also come to St. Michael's in recognition of the work of the Church and a desire to help assure that this work can continue. These monies usually support ongoing activities such as religious education, capital building maintenance or music and become part of the Church's endowment. Individuals often contribute to these funds through their wills, from unexpected windfalls, or in honor of special occasions or special people in their lives.

While money is only one way St. Michael's is supported by parishioners, it is a very important way. Without the generous contributions both from our current congregation and from our predecessors, we would not enjoy the rich and vibrant ministry we deeply value.


