HOLY WEEK

WHAT IS HOLY WEEK?

During the last week of the Lenten season we celebrate Holy Week, a sacred time of the year for Christians when the events of Christ's passion, death, and resurrection are remembered. In the remembering of the sacred stories, we hope not only to remember, but to experience the drama of these stories ourselves, that we may know Christ's love for us in a new way. All are welcome at any or all of these services!

Palm Sunday. This special liturgy begins with a procession of the congregation and the blessing of the palms, commemorating the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. The Gospel reading is the complete story of the Passion. The service underlines the contrast between the crowd's joyous greeting of their king and then their condemnation of him—the contrast between shouts of "Alleluia" and "Crucify him!"

Monday and Tuesday. We gather together on the Monday and Tuesday of Holy Week for a brief time of prayer and the Eucharist. At these services, lay people are asked to preach.

Wednesday. At 7:00 p.m., we will gather for a Tenebrae service in the church. In this service, candles are extinguished gradually as we hear a series of readings about the passion story.

Maundy Thursday. The word maundy is derived from the Latin word mandatum (commandment) and refers to Jesus giving the "new commandment" to "love one another as I have loved you" to his disciples at the Last Supper (John 13:34). The Maundy Thursday service commemorates the Last Supper and often focuses on two things Jesus did at the Last Supper: the washing of the disciples' feet and the institution of the sacrament of Holy Communion. The service ends in complete silence with the stripping of the altar, in recognition of Jesus' prayers in the Garden of Gethsemane and the despair and death to come.

Good Friday. This day commemorates the crucifixion of Jesus. During this solemn service, we mourn for the death of Jesus and for our own sins.

Easter Eve, Saturday. The Easter Vigil is called the "king of liturgies." At 7:00 p.m., we light the new fire of Easter and move from darkness to light telling the ancient stories of God's people. We proclaim the Easter message, "Christ is Risen!" Bring your bells and other musical instruments.

Easter Sunday. This is the most important day of celebration in the Christian year. On this day we celebrate how Christ overcame death to rise to new life, offering his redemption and love to all.

ANNUAL MEETING RESULTS

After discussion at the Annual Meeting, the Vestry convened and decided to display the "Black Lives Matter" sign in front of the Church while moving forward to address the issues of racism. Many thanks to all who attended the meeting and all who have agreed to serve on the Vestry and as delegates to the Diocesan Convention.



A CALL FOR MAN-POWER!

Planning is underway for the Spring Tag Sale. In the past, Vince Johnson has graciously been the point person for larger-item donations, working to arrange pick-up time, manpower, and storage. Currently Vince must focus on his health and recovery and rightfully so. This is a plea for assistance in filling this vital role. So, guys, if you want to help with the Tag Sale here is a perfect opportunity. Ideally, a team consisting of an acting leader, with 2-4 additional strong men and a truck (or two) would work perfectly to share the load. The majority of pick-ups, beginning in late March, are stored offsite at various locations until the week prior to the sale. At that time the items, depending on storage location, are either transported to the rectory garage for pricing or held until the day of the sale and brought directly to the Tent Sale. The timing for all pickups is worked out by the team leader directly with the team and donor. The number of pick-ups varies greatly from sale to sale. It could be just a few or it could be several.

PARISH FINANCIAL UPDATE: OPERATING INCOME/EXPENSES FOR JANUARY

Total Pledges Received: \$41,533 vs. Budget of \$19,333 (215% of Budget)

This is the amount of income from pledges alone that we have received. Note that this total includes pledges that were "pre-paid" last year for 2016.

Total Operating Income: \$58,076 vs. Budget of \$27,254 (213% of Budget)

This is our total income and includes rental income, fund raising (including pledges), memorial gifts, altar guild flower income, hospitality, tag sale, and other miscellaneous income.

Total Operating Expenses: \$31,750 vs. Budget of \$27,566 (115%)

This is the dollars needed to run the church, including salaries, utilities, repaying our building loan from the Diocese, outreach, rectory expenses, administrative expenses, mission and ministry, worship and music, congregation development, grounds upkeep, and snow removal.

EXPLORING OUR FAITH TOGETHER

LIVES OF COURAGE AND FAITH: 2016 TUESDAY LENTEN SERIES CONTINUES IN MARCH

St. Michael's Tuesday evening Lenten series has been wonderful. If you haven't had a chance to attend, please do! We gather on Tuesday evenings at 5:15 p.m. for dinner, then move to the Meeting Room for our program and end with Compline by 7:15 p.m. You may come for any or all parts of the evening. All are welcome.

Lives of Faith and Courage is a series where we learn about inspiring and faithful individuals and how they respond (or have responded) to various world challenges with amazing vision, imagination, and action. Some of these individuals are still alive, others have died. Some of these individuals are well-known, others are not.

Tuesday, March 1, Joanna Macy, presented by Jean Smith. Joanna Macy writes, "The most remarkable feature of this historical moment on Earth is not that we are on the way to destroying the world, we've actually been on the way for quite a while. It is that we are beginning to wake up, as from a millennia long sleep, to a whole new relationship to our world, to ourselves, and to each other." Author, Buddhist scholar, and environmental activist, Johanna Macy is an acclaimed teacher. It is her goal to help us identify our curiosity, energy, and strength that together we may live out the active hope our world needs now.

Tuesday, March 8, Greg Boyle, presented by Mary Lindquist. A Jesuit priest famous for his gang intervention programs in Los Angeles, Fr. Greg Boyle makes winsome connections between service and delight, compassion and awe. He heads Homeboy Industries, which employs former gang members in a constellation of businesses. This is not work of helping, he says, but of finding kinship. The point of Christian service, as he lives it, is about "our common calling to delight in one another."

Tuesday, March 15, Albert Schweitzer, presented by Karen Guthrie. Albert Schweitzer, a Noble Peace Prize awardee, was born in 1875 in a small village in Alsace, then part of Germany. By age 29, Schweitzer held doctorates in philosophy and religion, was an acclaimed organist and a world authority on Bach, had published three books, and had held positions as a church pastor, a principal of a theological seminary, and a university professor. But many years earlier, aware of the desperate medical needs of Africans, he had decided that at age 30 he would undertake medical studies, become a doctor and devote the rest of his life to direct service in Africa. In 1913, at the age of 37, Dr. Schweitzer and his wife, Hélène, opened a hospital in Lambaréné, Gabon, and he spent most of the rest of his life there, dying there at age 90.

ADULT FORUMS FOR MARCH

The Adult Forum meets from 9:00-10:00 a.m. on Sundays in the Meeting Room. All are welcome.

During the Lenten Adult Forums from February 14 through March 13, we are looking at three elements of the Baptismal Covenant, asking ourselves what they mean to us and finding different ways we can live them out. On the first three Sundays of Lent we discussed the Creed ("Do you believe…"), and continued with the apostles' teaching and fellowship, and then with persevering in resisting evil. The series continues through the end of Lent, as follows:

March 6, "Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ?"—What is the Good News, for you personally, for the world? Jean Smith will lead.

March 13, "Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself? Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being?"—Sarah Benton leads.

STRONG MIND CLEAR HEART: A CHRISTIAN-BUDDHIST RETREAT IN MAY

Last spring, we welcomed Will Duncan and Ann Curry to speak at St. Michael's about their experience completing a three-year solitary meditation retreat. They were such amazing teachers and such wonderful people that we have invited them back to do a retreat at Hallelujah Farm over Memorial Day Weekend, May 27–29. This retreat will be focused on mediation and prayer techniques that help us develop deep compassion. It will draw from both the Christian and Buddhist traditions and involve times of teaching, practice, silence, and conversation. Below is a description written by Will Duncan:


Practice: We will learn three essential tools for understanding what meditation is and how it works. These tools can be applied to your present meditation or other spiritual practice.

Ideas: Drawing on Buddhist and Christian scriptural practices we will explore techniques on how to develop deep compassion in the midst of everyday situations and difficulties.

Reflection: As we approach the beginning of summer we take some time for reflection and to contemplate the potential of our coming year.
