ABOUT JOYFUL RESISTANCE

We live in turbulent times that are at once political, emotional and spiritual. Many in our nation and in our world are wondering how to stand against actions that transgress our deepest held values and beliefs. How do we resist? How do we enact change? How do we make our voices heard?

This year's Lenten Series theme is Joyful Resistance. Resistance is a way of saying "no" to actions, movements, values, temptations and violations to which we object. And it is a deeply spiritual practice. Lent is traditionally a time when we practice saying "no" to things which distract or obstruct our relationship with God.

Jesus practiced resistance all through his life: he resisted Satan in the desert, he resisted the ostracizing of marginalized people, he resisted the unjust practices of the Roman government and he resisted many of the traditional religious views of his time.

As Christians, we are called to resist all that opposes the values of our faith. While we might not always agree on those values and how they are lived out, our faith teaches us that resistance is an important part of our calling.

We call the series joyful resistance because the joy we have in the love of Christ and in our faith is the foundation for our resistance, a resistance that must never lead us to hate or violence.

Lastly, the point of this Lenten series is not to address or debate particular issues, but to address the spiritual, historical, political and artistic ways of engaging in the practice of joyful resistance. We will finish our evenings with candlelit prayers and singing in the church. Please invite friends and neighbors whom you think might be interested. All are welcome!

About our Speakers for the Lenten Series:

Ann Braden is a Brattleboro-based community organizer. She founded and leads the statewide advocacy group GunSenseVT, which helped to pass a gun violence prevention bill in 2015 and is continuing to push for universal background checks. She also recently started the Local Love Brigade, a group of Vermont-

ers banding together to respond to incidents of hate with giant helpings of love. Inspired by the simplicity and power of sending love postcards to victims of hate, nine other states have followed suit and started Local Love Brigades of their own. Ann is part of the group putting together the Windham County Action Network (WeCAN), which is focused on streamlining communication to help people connect and plug in to the good work being done by grassroots organizations in the area. She is a former middle school social studies teacher and lives in town with her husband and two children.

Maurice L. Harris has served in various leadership capacities at large corporations and small businesses across several industries, as well as in community organizations dedicated to social change. He is presently the Diocesan Communications Minister for the Episcopal Church in Vermont. Harris earned his Master's degree in Organizational Leadership from Mount Saint Joseph University in Cincinnati, Ohio, and is currently working on a PhD in Ethical & Creative Leadership at the Union Institute & University. He and his husband reside in Brattleboro and are members of St. Michael's Episcopal Church.

Ideally the interested volunteer or volunteers will co-chair the spring sale on the first weekend in May with Anne Cook in order to see the scope of the job. Anne says "I am happy to train and help the new person or people work into the job. Sharing the leadership means each of us would only need to lead one sale per year. If no one steps up to the plate, I will step down as the Tag Sale chairperson after the May Sale and the Tag Sale will end.

Remember our tag sale averages \$12,000-13,000 annually and provides invaluable funds for local outreach and many unexpected church expenses. In addition, the Tag Sale is a way for our church community to come together in fellowship and deepening connections of friendship. LOAVES AND FISHES

How can we, and do we, as community support the mission of Loaves and Fishes, a community meal in Brattleboro?

Loaves and Fishes serves a full meal two days a week on Tuesdays and Fridays at 11:30 a.m. We also serve 35 children and 12 teachers a hot meal at the Centre for Children in the Centre Church. We also pack weekend meals for 12 families. We have a food giveaway table with frozen meals, personal care items, and canned and dry goods. Loaves and Fishes serves many people in our community: homeless people, working people, and people looking for community.

Our budget is from donations from churches and individuals. We are a member of The Vermont Foodbank. We have joined a CSA and local businesses give us food. St. Michael's is a main contributor to Loaves and Fishes. Mission and Outreach has supported us in building a vegetable and fruit cool room in honor of Joel Hill, purchasing our CSA membership, purchasing refrigerators, and supporting our budget.

We have individuals from St Michael's:

- Contributing used frozen and recyclable containers.
- Baking for our dessert table
- Contributing vegetables from home gardens
- Contributing extra potatoes and onions from the "buy one get one free" program at grocery stores
- Donating used clothing for the winter
- Picking up food from the COOP, Price Chopper, and Food Bank
- Donating funds to help our budget
- Cooking and preparing meals
- Donating travel personal care items from hotels
- Slicing onions
- Cooking a turkey or ham at home
- Packing meals for the weekend families

We always need more volunteers and donated items. I look forward to adding more people from St Michael's to this ministry!

The monthly meeting of the Vestry was held on February 16, 2017. At this meeting newly elected members Janet Brocklehurst, Mark Horton and Jeanette Landin were welcomed. Following an opening prayer and introductions, Dwelling in the Word inspired Bible discussion was held. Mary gave an overview of what it means to be a Vestry member and reviewed the yearly Vestry schedule.

Minutes from previous meetings were approved and Treasure Wayne Cook gave an update on the finances of the Church. Income was good, expenses for the month look high but that is due to some annual and quarterly bills being paid. Wayne also gave a report on a renewal of the Building for the Future fund drive. The annual budget was approved by the Vestry.

The sound system will be getting some minor upgrades with the purchase of a new microphone and sound recorder. The next step will be to evaluate the hearing assisted system already in place and decide if it is sufficient for our needs.

The Rector's Report from Mary included information on the Women's Retreat, and the schedule for Lent. The theme for this year is "Joyful Resistance" with various leaders and speakers being scheduled. The Buildings and Grounds committee report mentioned much of the work the group has been performing behind the scenes.

Water Justic is a global conference that will be held in New York City and webcast all over the world. With a sharp focus on the need for water justice initiatives in areas of access, droughts, pollution, rising tides, and flooding, Trinity Institute aims to offer actionable guidance for individuals, congregations, and the larger faith community surrounding these issues.

St. Michael's will be a hosting partner for Trinity Institutes, "Water Justice Conference" on Thursday and Friday, March 23-24. We will be webcasting the conference in the Meeting Room. After introductory and response, storytellers from around their world will describe how they experience the water crisis in their contexts.

2:30–4:00 p.m., Session 2: The Global and the Local Speakers in Trinity Church, New York; and St. Paul's Cathedral, London will address issues in those cities to model how communities can solve local problems in light of global realities. Opening Talk: Kim Stanley Robinson – The award-winning, best-selling science fiction author's forthcoming novel New York 2140, offers a vision of the future of New York City in the 22nd century, "a flooded, but vibrant metropolis" where inhabitants have adapted to sea-level rise caused by climate change. Panel response – Those working on addressing how we can preserve New York

from sea level rise and storm surge – the science, the politics, the cost. Moderator: Catherine McVay Hughes, former Manhattan Community Board 1 Chair. Panelists: Bill Golden – New York/New Jersey Storm Surge Working Group; Siobhan Collins – Manager, Water Program, Ceres; Rob Freudenberg – Regional Plan Association (RPA)

Friday, March 24





EXPLORING THE "OTHER" FOR FIVE SUNDAYS IN LENT

ADULT EDUCATION FORUMS FOR THE FIVE SUNDAYS OF LENT MARCH 5—APRIL 2, 2017

Adult Forums are held each Sunday from 9:00–10:00 a.m. in the upstairs meeting room. Everyone is invited, including visitors.

"We are in a time where there is a terrible desire to create an Other that we may compare ourselves favorably to, thus forcing a separation to keep contamination (violence) away." Jeff Lewis in an email dated February 11, 2017, to Nancy Barber, Chair of the Forum Committee.

During the five Sundays of Lent, we define and explore our relationship to "the Other" both within our Hebrew and Christian traditions, within our nation as it developed, and within ourselves. We end by exploring what it means to embrace the "Other" and the gift it provides. Part of the way we experience ourselves is in relationship to other people, looking for ways we differ. At times that difference is something to aspire to, at times that difference is something to reject with all our being. From the beginning of our faith story, we see our relationship with "The Other" as a way of experiencing our relationship with God.

The schedule and topics for each forum are outlined below:

March 5: The "Other" in Hebrew Scripture – Jean Smith. We start with our faith story in the Hebrew Scriptures looking at who are considered the Other and how we are called to relate to them. When is the Other to be treated as a threat and when as a member of our own family? Wrestling with this we define our morality and our covenant with God

March 12: The "Other" in Christian Scripture – Jeff Lewis. In the Christian Scriptures Jesus clearly invites us to embrace the Other, the sick, the tax collector, and the Samaritan as a fellow member of the family of God. What is the limit of this relationship? We explore Jesus stories and relationships as ways of understanding the "Others" today and our relationship with them.

March 19: The "Other" in the development of America – Forum leader to be determined. Early Settlers coming to a new world for profit and faith immediately had to experience the Other as they encountered Native Americans already here. Many of those early colonists were themselves the Other coming to the new world because of rejection. We will look at American history and how it has defined the Other down through time.

March 26: Ourselves as the "Other" – Phillip Wilson. This Sunday we explore the different and often contradictory ways we define ourselves...how the Other lives within us. We will look at ways we both embrace and reject the Other within us. We will look at how that effects the way we look at the Other outside of ourselves.

April 2: The Richness of the "Other" in Our Lives – Craig Hammond. And finally, we will explore the ways that the Other enriches our lives. How do we turn what could be seen as a threat into a gift? Could it just be that the Garden of God is composed of a wealth of different flowers?

During the five Sundays of Lent, we define and explore our relationship to "the Other" both within our Hebrew and Christian traditions, within our nation as it developed, and within ourselves.
