are: Sapientia (wisdom); Adonai (Lord); Radix Jesse (Root of Jesse); Clavis David (Key of David); Oriens (Dayspring); Rex Gentium (King of All Peoples); and Emmanuel (God With Us). The names are remarkable in that, for the most part, they are descriptive of ways in which Christ both fulfills prophecy and extends our understanding of the nature of God.

To accompany the chants, the choir will sing 5 anthems that reflect the nature or emotion of the names of Christ. As before, the congregation will join in the singing of Advent hymns, and the lessons of the season will be read.

These 7 chants are the various names of Christ, with each g name representing a Scriptural attribute. The seven names jo

O Antiphons" of Advent. These 7 ancient chants date

back to the 6th century. They were such an important

part of the early Christian community's experience that it was said that during Advent, one "kept the Great O" in

preparation for the day of the incarnation.

DIOCESE OF VERMONT GRANTS AND LOAN COMMITTEE SUPPORTS DISCIPLESHIP & DISCERNMENT MINISTRY



On Saturday November 2, Mary and I met via video conference with the Grants and Loan Committee of the Diocese of Vermont. This diocesan committee has funded a major portion of this ministry for the last two years. We were meeting with them to discuss our proposal to support the ministry through its final phase in the first half of 2020 with a request of \$7,500.

We shared about what has happened in the ministry in the last year and our goals for the coming year (see in italics below). The committee asked questions, especially about how the fruits of the ministry could be shared more broadly within the diocese.

We expressed our hope that this can be a particular focus in the winter and spring. The committee wrote back on the same day to share their decision to support the grant.

Thank you to the Diocese of Vermont and to all of you at St. Michael's who have participated in the ministry. I'm hopeful that the fruits of what we're learning can and will be shared.

The St. Michael's Discipleship Ministry is an experimental movement made up of individuals called to explore, create and reclaim the practice of following Jesus in community in this particular time and place. Our hypothesis is: if we draw on the scriptures, tradition, reason (12-step group structure principles, community organizing principles, Christian history), we can create a ministry that will:

- Manifest the fruits of the Spirit in individuals (Galatians 5:22) Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Generosity, Faithfulness, Gentleness, Self-Control;
- Deepen relationships with God and with other people inside and outside the parish;
- Form new leaders and ministries inside and outside the church.

In 2020 the project will be specifically focused on:

- Following through with the projects that were launched in year 2 through the missional training program, including the formation of a St. Michael's team that partners with the Greater Falls Community Justice Center to support people transitioning out of prison and addiction through the creation of a St. Michael's Circle of Support and Accountability (COSA) team;
- Focusing collectively on one missional project that includes people beyond St. Michael's, perhaps starting a L'Arche community in Vermont. L'Arche communities "provide homes and workplaces where people with and without intellectual disabilities live and work together as peers, create inclusive communities of faith and friendship, and transform society through relationships that cross social boundaries . . . All L'Arche communities welcome people of all faiths and those who are not religiously affiliated." – www. larcheusa.org;
- Engaging in communal practice of the Daily Office and celebration of the major feasts and liturgical year as begun in year 2;
- Exploring partnerships and training more broadly in the diocese, perhaps through satellite discipleship groups, Zoom trainings, day-long retreats or trainings;
- Creating a transition plan at St. Michael's to ensure that the practices from the ministry can be continued beyond the Priest for Discipleship and Discernment's tenure.

MISSION IS "THE CHURCH SENT OUT INTO THE WORLD."

We are having a church-wide conversation on Saturday morning, January 11, to help us discern what God is calling our faith community to do in the world. It is a way for us to discover a deeper understanding of our shared values and of our spiritual purpose that will guide us now and in the future. The conversation is a follow-up to the conversation we had about the 'Black Lives Matter' sign in which many people asked, "What do we stand for?" and "How do we proclaim this to our community?" It will complement the information gathered from the small groups in November which explored the impact of the Ministry for Discipleship and Discernment on the spiritual life of our congregation. The information from these different conversations will be discussed prayerfully at the Vestry retreat in February as we ponder next steps.

We will be providing more information in the January Guardian, and we urge everyone to put the morning of January 11 on their calendars. We are looking forward to your participation!

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EXPLORING OUR FAITH TOGETHER

A DEVOTION BY DR. PAT SAXON ON DEBORAH SMITH DOUGLAS' ESSAY "CROSSING BOUNDARIES CAN CHANGE OUR LIVES FOREVER" From St .Michael's Social Justice Committee for Advent 2019

Since the beginning of time, boundary crossings have resonated with mythic, symbolic, psychological, and spiritual power. "At the edges of things," asserts Deborah Smith Douglas, "we move from one reality—familiar, known—to another reality—unknown," and possibly dangerous. Consider the Israelites' crossing the Red Sea or their descendants' journey over the Jordan into the Promised Land. According to Douglas, these passages were more than symbolic divides; they were real evidence of the providence of God. She cites too the New Exodus from slavery to freedom for African Americans as they crossed the Ohio River into the North. More radical than these is the "breathtaking generosity" of the Incarnation: God chooses to save the world by becoming one of us.*

Our boundaries may lie close to home, may be inner rather than outer—an opportunity for ministry we are avoiding or denying; it may be some "unseen line" that separates us from volunteering in a school, hospital, prison, homeless shelter, with the physically challenged or mentally distressed.

Douglas was blessed with a close relationship with a remarkable border crosser: a diminutive Catholic Sister of Charity, who, after a career in health care, quietly traversed the US border into Mexico several times a year for many years. Sr. Mary Joaquin (or Madre, as the campesinos called her) regularly made the journey between Santa Fe and San Miguel de Allende, her car loaded with boxes of donated supplies for her clinic which served some of Mexico's poorest. Actually, Sr. Mary had already crossed a number of borders—first when she entered the Sisters of Charity as a young woman and second, when, after retirement from running a hospital, she longed for a life of contemplation and joined a small Benedictine monastery in Mexico. But grieved by the compesinos' poverty, illness, and child mortality, she knew she could not do nothing, so she began a small clinic in her kitchen. "Having made herself profoundly available to God by means of contemplative silence, she found herself sent by God, in love, to do justice." (Douglas)

So what boundaries in your life hold you back from following Jesus's call to justice? Are your "border guards" fear, prejudice, ignorance, apathy? Do you get fenced in by imagining that justice work would upset your safe, well-provisioned life? Does your lack of confidence undermine a trust that God will equip you for the journey?

Take some time to quietly hold these questions in your heart this week and listen for the Spirit's voice within. Justice requires us to step into our prophetic spirituality "because Love desires it. Love longs for divisions to end and barriers to fall, because Love longs for everything to participate in its own divine eternal, indivisible union." (Douglas)

Beloved Border Crosser, clear whatever blocks our way from engaging in the work of justice. Amen.

NOVEMBER VESTRY MEETING REPORT

We opened our time together with a time of reflection on the concept of November.

Duncan Hilton and Jeff Haim presented an update on the MDD programs and next steps going forward.

Bruce Lawrence, treasurer, reviewed financial updates. We are on target as far as our budgeting for the year. A report of the quarterly Endowment Committee was discussed. An update on the Stewardship Drive was also reported.

Rev. Mary reviewed key dates upcoming during Advent including a farewell breakfast for Wayne and Anne Cook. The MDD small group conversations had 75 folks participating with the collating of reports in progress. She addressed a building concern from the Nursery School. The Vestry voted to have Buildings and Grounds to do work on the creation of a more secure space for the Nursery School entry from the parking lot, for a cost of up to \$1250.00. She noted that the Interfaith Action Group would be having a gathering on Feb 1, 2020 with inter-church listening regarding social justice topics important to the town.

Carolyn, Sr. Warden, discussed the nominating process for creating a slate of candidates for Vestry and delegates to the conventions such that prospective candidates will have an opportunity to speak with the Wardens about being a Vestry member. A discussion regarding Emergency Preparedness education was considered; follow-up on format and consultant will be pursued (Ushers, choir, Vestry members for training and, perhaps, an adult forum for those interested).

An All Parish meeting on January 11th (Saturday morning with donuts and coffee) will invite us to discuss "What God is calling us to do in this world". This is a continuation of the conversation that happened in July. Communications via Guardian, E-Blasts, Sunday bulletins, and having the open-ended questions on flip chart sheets hanging in the Undercroft upon which parishioners may write responses, as well as, an on line option and pen and paper option. We want to hear from as many church family members as possible. Judy (who was thanked for her leg work in preparing possible questions), Imogene, Carolyn, and Janet will be the Task Force to make this happen.

Committee reports:

Ricky reported that B&G is making the roof concerns a high priority. The Vestry instructed Ricky and Mary to support Vince Johnson in seeking bids for a new roof including a solar option. Once bids are received, the Vestry will formulate a plan to pay for the new roof.

Monthly Listening Corner: Imogene and Janet reported on a wide range of concerns raised by parishioners, as well as a new member and a visitor (very positive impression of our church community). Judy and Janet had breakfast with some of the 8 o'clock attendees with additional input. It was recommended that there be a monthly check-in with the first service parishioners.

Carolyn reported the Healing Team joined with St Mary in the Mountains Healing Team for a joint Retreat. It was an opportunity to recommit and to deepen our spiritual journey.

Carolyn offered a closing prayer.
