


Let us confess our sins to God.

There is no one who calls on your name, or attempts to take hold of you;


for you have hidden your face from us, and have delivered us into the hand of our iniquity.

Mark 13: 24-27

Preceding the Gospel... The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said, "In those days, after that suffering,

the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light,

and the stars will be falling from heaven, and the powers in the heavens will be shaken. Then they will see 'the Son of Man coming in clouds' with great power and glory. Then he will send out the angels, and gather his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of heaven.

"From the fig tree learn its lesson: as soon as its branch becomes tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near. So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that he is near, at the very gates. Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.

"But about that day or hour no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. Beware, keep alert; for you do not know when the time will come. It is like a man going on a journey, when he leaves home and puts his slaves in charge, each with his work, and commands the doorkeeper to be on the watch. Therefore, keep awake—for you do not know when the master of the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, or else he may find you asleep when he comes suddenly. And what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake."





The Presider asks the Holy Spirit to consecrate the bread and the wine to be God's holy food.


And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,



1: In Advent, we are preparing for the Feast of the Incarnation. Incarnation literally means "in the flesh." Although Christians affirm the goodness of our bodies in remembering that God has become a body in Jesus Christ, we often do not act; we often regard our faith as something mental and not embodied. I hope you will join me in the Season of Advent with a bit of an experiment; we will practice joining gentle movement, breath and body awareness exercises to prayer and scripture, in the hope of experiencing the goodness of the incarnation in our own bodies.
