# FROM THE RECTORY

### **BABY GRAND**

I've always been dissatisfied by the names churches give to the beginning of their fall program year. "Fall Kick-Off" seems too sporty. "Homecoming" does not take into account all the people who have been attending church all summer. "Grand Opening" does not make much sense, except if you might be returning to church after a long pandemic. So, this year we decided to have a soft opening in July after being out of the church for 16 months, followed by a grand opening in the fall.

In any case, the September newsletter was supposed to be the place where we could announce our Grand Opening, the return of all our education programs, choir practice, full liturgy with acolytes and crucifers and both elements of Holy Communion. This definitely felt doable in early July, but not so doable now. We had expected that the wide distribution of the COVID vaccine we would be fully in the season of post-pandemic. But COVID with its Delta variant, has, yet again, foiled our plans.

I had a bit of a tantrum at a Christian Education meeting in early August. When talking about how to accommodate our programs for children and youth this fall to new COVID restrictions, one wise participant said, "We just have to be flexible." I replied, "I'm tired of being flexible! I want to be rigid! I want to be able to actually plan something!"

I'm sure all of you share my frustration. We thought we were done with all this uncertainty, but we are not.

The good news is that we are not back at square one. We are far from locking the doors of the church and retreating again to our homes to do Zoom church. We are still able to come together in the church, albeit with masks. We now know a whole lot more about how COVID surges go up and go down. Most of us are vaccinated, which offers a great deal of protection. But despite my tantrum, we will have to continue to be flexible.

So as of today, we are still having a grand opening on Sunday, September 12. I wondered if we should call it a "grand-ish" opening? A "moderately grand" opening? But I settled on my favorite, a "Baby Grand Opening," with a nod to all the piano enthusiasts out there. While we won't be able to offer all the children and youth offerings of the past, we will offer some. While we won't have our full liturgical party with a Communion of bread and wine, we will still be able to offer our simplified liturgy with bread. While we cannot yet do a true Coffee Hour, we will continue to offer food and fellowship outside, under the tent after the 10:15 am service. And, we will still be dancing the Jerusalema in front of the church following the 10:15 service on September 12.

I hope you can join us in person or via our Vimeo service for our Baby Grand Opening on Sunday, September 12!

# CHRISTIAN EDUCATION FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH

We have modified and simplified our offerings for children and youth this fall. Below is our plan, but we are open to being flexible depending on how things unfold with vaccinations for young children and the Delta variant. We will be taking cues from the public schools in our region regarding safety precautions.

**Safety Precautions:** All children, youth and adults will be masked at all times regardless of vaccination status. Godly Play will be offered outside, and for those who wish, Holy Communion will be distributed under the tent (see below for more details). There will also be two pews reserved in the back of the church for children and families, for those who prefer to sit in a designated area in the church

**Godly Play (Preschool–4th Grade):** We will be offering Godly Play outside this fall. Children are invited to gather under the tent between 10–10:15 am. Beginning at 10:15, there will be a time of song and preparation, followed by a Godly Play story. Following the story, the kids will be taken to the playground for their response/play time. Kids will return with teachers to the tent by the time of the Peace (in the liturgy). Parents are invited to fetch their children and bring them into the church for Holy Communion, or remain outside under the tent and Holy Communion will be brought to you there. Holy Mayhem (5th–9th Grade): Holy Mayhem kids will meet in person every other week, from 10:15 until Holy Communion time (approximately 10:15–11am). Kids are invited to gather under the tent and proceed to their classroom at 10:15. On the "off weeks" when Holy Mayhem is not offered, kids are invited to act as helpers with the Godly Play class. 
The Discipleship Group will continue to meet on Zoom with some in-person sessions. For more information, please contact Jonah Johnson at jonahkonane@gmail.com


# THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH — AN INTRODUCTION

# AN INVITATION TO GODLY PLAY



Susan Heimer What about the children? During pandemic times adults were able to meet over Zoom, but after our valiant effort to reach young children over Zoom, we realized that this was not a developmentally workable medium for

them. Therefore it is our hope that we may again be able to try to gather children — masked, spaced reasonably, and mostly outdoors — to renew our commitment to Christian community again this fall.

Over the last 14 years or so, our children's ministry at St. Michael's has centered around a special program called Godly Play adapted from Maria Montessori's philosophy. Jerome Berryman, an Episcopal priest, developed stories from Hebrew and Christian scripture presented in a three-dimensional way, with liturgical language and symbolism, that has been used around the world in thousands of churches and institutions since 1991. The child is understood to be a spiritual being and the presentations honor elements of our faith tradition such as readiness, quietness, awe, and wonder. I had the honor and privilege of training with Sonya Stewart, the co-author of Berryman's first book, in the early 1990s. I am just one of the many who have loved and worked on this ministry over the years at St. Michael's.

Godly Play has two strong components. One is the thoughtful and intentional construction of the



classroom. Many, many people helped put together our Godly Play room with its lovely handmade bookcases. New stories have been added every year. (Peek in and look at the room sometime!) Our dedicated team of craftspeople, "storytellers," and "doorkeepers" have made the stories come alive for the children in the classroom. But because of Covid, we have decided that we are going to forego using our beautiful children's worship space this fall.

The second strong component of Godly Play is biblical storytelling by the spoken word. This we can do! Storytelling is going to be even more important this year. Berryman has said that teaching biblical facts does not automatically make people believe in God, but God's presence itself is in the midst of scripture. The stories are waiting to be told! It has been my experience that being exposed to Godly Play versions deepens my own understanding of them. It is my hope and prayer that these lessons touch the lives of all who experience them.

### How can you help?

**Be patient.** You may not find us to be very quiet. During the beginning of the service, we may either be outside the windows under the tent gathering for the story and "wondering" questions or joining for friendship and fellowship under the windows on the other side of the church.

**Support us.** Be interested in the program. Find out more about it. Talk to families. Include us in your prayers.

**Consider joining us.** It is a wonderful gift to get to relate to the children and parents in our parish, and children relating to us may be part of their ministry. # ST. MICHAEL'S HEALING TEAM RETURNS

Members of St. Michael's Healing Team are looking forward to a "soft opening" in September of their ministry of praying individually with people who want prayers for healing, thanksgiving, or any other need.

Rather than meeting during the Eucharist, as in the past, members will be stationed next door in the chapel and will pray with parishioners after both the 8 am and 10:15 am services. For protection, Healing Team members will be masked and will offer hand sanitizer to parishioners, as well as adjusting how close or distant they are depending on the comfort of those wanting prayers.

Leadership rotates among the current 8 members, with planning meetings after the 10:15 service on the fourth Sunday of each month. Healing team membership is open to people who are willing to participate in training and a day-long retreat, which has often been held with members of the healing ministry of St. Mary's in the Mountains.

# SUMMARY OF AUGUST MEETING OF THE VESTRY

St. Michael's Vestry met on Thursday, August 19, largely in person with two members participating virtually. Vestryman Steve Guerriero opened with two poems well suited to lead us into the evening's work: "For a New Beginning" by John O'Donohue and "The Road Ahead" by Thomas Merton. Consider these last lines of the latter:

# I will not fear, for you are ever with me, and you will never leave me to face my perils alone.

First on our agenda was Eli Phoenix of Phoenix Roofing. His presentation proposing replacement of the church roof and the reshingling of the Bradley wing roof was thorough and helpful generating several questions and food for thought. This is a project under consideration for next summer.

Parishioners Laura Andrews and Cary Gaunt followed with a discussion proposing that we install solar panels at St. Michael's. Laying out logistics and advantages, they made a good case that doing so would further establish St. Michael's as a strong leader, responsible for both the community and the environment. We then heard our Treasurer's Report from Bruce Lawrence which contained no big surprises nor any cause for concern.

Finally we heard from Adwoa Lewis-Wilson, who'd been encouraged by Mary to create a proposal calling for us as a parish to do something larger, more integral, and even liturgical in our quest to reckon with Bishop Hopkins in our past. Named "Becoming Beloved Community: a vision for parish transformation and wholeness," the proposal is thoughtful, well-founded, comprehensive — and it promises to be a most effective guide for the "what next" in our life as a parish as we recognize and grapple with Hopkins' justification of slavery in the mid-nineteenth century.

Mary closed with a truncated Rector's Report elucidating primarily the most recent pandemic safety measures St. Michael's is taking.

It was a full meeting!
