Dear St. Michael's Family:

I am writing an update to the Guardian which we thought was done and ready to print a few days ago. Fortunately, we did not print it, so I can add a note with some news. Yesterday, with the COVID cases around the country sky-rocketing and my own daughter testing positive for COVID, we (Staff and Wardens) decided to take a pause on in-person Sunday worship. For January, we will return to Zoom (just like in the lock-down time) for Sunday worship. We are doing this in the hope that we can protect our community against the surge of COVID cases and hope, when we see more fully what will happen with the Omicron variant, that we can return to hybrid worship. The good news is that we know how to do Zoom worship and the pivot to Zoom and back to hybrid worship, will trust, will be smooth.

I also want to note that we are not going back to "lock-down" at the church. The church office will still be open, in-person meetings (with masks) can still happen. We just want to be especially careful about gathering in large numbers.

Thank you all for your flexibility and sticking with us through all these different forms of worshipping together! I have no doubt that God will be glorified however we gather. See you on Zoom!



ST. MICHAEL'S CELEBRATES MARTIN LUTHER KING JR. SUNDAY ON JANUARY 16



On January 16, St. Michael's will celebrate Martin Luther King Jr. Sunday. Our speaker this year will be the Reverend Doctor Arnold Isidore Thomas, a longtime resident and clergy person in Vermont with incredible depth of experience with social justice work and racial healing.

Reverend Thomas is currently the Pastor of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Jericho, Vermont. Ordained as a Pastor in the United Church of Christ, Rev. Thomas served as Conference Minister of the Vermont Conference of the United Church of Christ, the first African American denominational leader in Vermont. Rev. Thomas also served as Minister for Education, Ecumenical and Interfaith Relations at the Riverside Church in New York City and Adjunct Professor of Religion at New York Theological Seminary for ten years before returning to Vermont.

While Reverend Thomas will not be with us in person because he will serving his own church, we will listen to his pre-recorded sermon at church and on the Livestream on January 16.



MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. DAY OF SERVICE, JANUARY 17

Martin Luther King, Jr. Day is the only federal holiday designated as a national day of service to encourage all Americans to volunteer to improve their communities. It's often called "a day on, not a day off." We at St. Michael's are blessed to be in fellowship with so many of you who have chosen "a day on" over and over, year round, and we especially thank you for stepping forward most recently to help with refugee resettlement. Yet in the spirit of this holiday about service in community, you may wish to spend a few hours working on different tasks or with people different from those you encounter the rest of the year. In early January, the Outreach Committee will share information about some one-day service projects with several community organizations for small groups of masked and vaccinated people.

We also invite you to join in The B.O.B. Drive, an effort to supplement our parish's ongoing food offerings with a special drive for non-food items that are most needed by people with limited means. We will collect these items from January 9–17. We will deliver them to Loaves & Fishes, St. Michael's Prison Ministry, Foodworks, our local refugee and asylum seeker programs (ECDC and CASP), and other partners. Return your offerings from the list below by January 17 to the Undercroft in a reusable or paper bag, CLEARLY LABELED on the outside stating what kind of item and how many. We will pass the boxes and bags directly to our partners based on the types of items each requested. Contact Alix Fedoruk at alixf@mac.com for more information.

Suggested items:

Acetaminophen (Tylenol), cold remedies (e.g. Dayquil, Nyquil, Emergen-C, throat lozenges), band-aids, deodorant, diapers, shampoo & conditioner, shaving cream, soap, paper towels, toilet paper, toothbrushestoothpaste-floss, dish liquid, laundry detergent, all-purpose cleaner, new men's clothing items: white Tshirts, white socks, underwear/boxers, mittens, hats.

BECOMING BELOVED COMMUNITY COVENANT GROUPS BEGIN JANUARY 25

The Becoming Beloved Community Focus Group of Nancy Ames, Paul Dedell, Adwoa Lewis-Wilson, Mary Lindquist, Carolyn Taylor-Olson, Phillip Wilson and Rosie Wojcik has been working together through the fall on opportunities for all of us to participate in this pilgrimage of Becoming a Beloved Community (BBC). One opportunity we are offering through Epiphany Season and Lent of this year is BBC Covenant Groups.

What is a Covenant Group?

A Covenant Group is a small group of perhaps six to ten people who make a commitment to meet regularly as a safe space with guidelines and facilitators for their time together. Our hope is that each group will develop a sense of closeness and trust over time and that this closeness and trust will enable us to listen, speak and grow in our love of God and our love for one another.

What do the Covenant Groups have to do with Becoming Beloved Community?

We are embracing the Covenant Groups as part of our great hope for the culture of mutual support, the Beloved Community, that with God's help we are working to become. In this coming season, the Covenant Groups will focus on the racial healing element of St. Michael's Becoming Beloved Community effort.

What resources will the Covenant Groups be using?

The Groups will use *The Church Cracked Open* by Stephanie Spellers and one of Bishop Hopkin's shorter writings as the springboards for our conversations. We will also use scripture, prayer and other relevant resources to help guide our conversations. Participants will be asked to read short pieces in preparation for our gatherings.

How will the time be structured?

The Covenant Groups will meet on Zoom, from 5:15–6:45 pm every Tuesday evening, January 25–April 5.

From 5:15 to 5:35, the Covenant Groups will all meet together to begin with prayer and an introduction to the large group about the topic for the evening.

From 5:35 to 6:20, each Covenant Group will meet in break-out rooms on Zoom for a time of conversation with two facilitators.

From 6:20 to 6:45, the Groups come back together for final reflections and a time of prayer.

We will hold this structure loosely and discern what works best for us.

Who will facilitate?

Persons from our congregation, including Mary Lindquist and Adwoa, will receive training and support in their roles as group facilitators.

Do I have to attend all 11 sessions?

It is our hope that everyone will be at all of the sessions because this allows the groups to develop trust and gain momentum; however, we know that it may be necessary to miss one or two of the sessions because of time conflicts.

I am new to the congregation. Is this a good opportunity for me to get to know the St. Michael's community?

YES! Please do not be shy. As a newcomer you may feel as if everyone knows one another already. This is not the case; we are all beginners here.

Talking about race scares me. I'm afraid of saying the wrong thing.

The Covenant Groups will be a place where we can risk being honest and vulnerable without fear of judgment or shame. One of the advantages of talking about race and other difficult issues in a faith community is that we start with the assumption that we are not perfect, we mess up a lot, and we need help. Fortunately, we believe in a God of mercy and forgiveness and a God who fills our faithful vulnerability with the promise of hope.



This is a helpful introduction, but I want to know more before I sign up.

CANDIDATES FOR THE VESTRY




Christine Hart:

SUMMARY OF DECEMBER MEETING OF THE VESTRY

The Vestry met both on Zoom and in person on December 16, 2021.

We began our meeting with a prayer created by Nancy Ames and a very fruitful sharing about how each of us struggles to create more patience in our daily lives.

Bruce Lawrence again gave us an encouraging report about the finances of the parish. We are right on target with our pledges and our expenses for 2021. We may have some larger expenses next month due to one-time, year-end expenses, but we will likely still have a balanced budget at the end of the year. Bruce has gathered a team of Jared Rediske, Doug Switzer and Jack Lilly to review with him the budget for next year.

Cary Gaunt gave us an update on the roof solar project which has been expanded to explore a Total Energy Management approach which might lead our parish to consider identifying a clear energy goal, perhaps adopting the Diocesan goal of getting 100% of our energy needs met through renewable energy by 2030. A group of knowledgeable people recently did a walk-through of the building exploring ways we might reduce our energy consumption. We hope that our solar panels will meet much of our energy needs but we may need to explore procuring other renewable sources. Cary is very excited that St. Michael's could become a model of how our faith community actually lives out its Mission statement of "caring for the earth."

Darcey Mercier informed the Vestry of the courses she is taking and some of her very timely research projects and the Vestry enthusiastically voted to approve her ordination to the Diaconate which will probably take place this summer in Burlington.

In the Rector's report, Mary mentioned that she notices many visitors at Sunday services and is looking for volunteers who can stand outside with her after Sunday services to welcome newcomers, invite them to the coffee hour, and be a personal connection for them. There will be a sign up sheet for vestry and other people can contact Mary about volunteering.

Re new Vestry Members, 3 people have agreed to serve: Chris Hart, Rosie Wojcik and David Treadwell. There will be biographies of them in *The Guardian* and the Sunday bulletins before the Annual Meeting which will be on January 30. Mary and Adwoa updated us on the Beloved Community initiatives starting in January and informed us that the MLK day speaker (by Zoom) will be Arnold Thomas, an African American who is the pastor of the Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Vermont.

Ricky led the Closing Prayer.
