FROM THE RECTORY

MY BURDEN IS LIGHT

'Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest.

Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light.'

Matthew 11: 28–30

It was wonderful to welcome so many people from St. Michael's and from our wider community to our Building Hope Open House on September 1. It was a beautiful, crisp and clear day and we enjoyed the "show and tell" at different stations devoted to each piece of the project. For our roof station, we had a sample of the copper to be used and a genuine piece of Guilford slate, just like the slate on St. Michael's current roof. We believe that the slate is original to the construction of the church in 1853; it is incredible that this beautiful, locally-sourced gift from the earth lasted so long and sheltered us so well for almost 170 years.

Getting a chance to hold the slate in my hands really impressed me — it was so heavy! I didn't realize that when we look at our roof, we are only seeing half of each piece of slate, as the slate is layered, one piece on top of another. We had a contest to "guess the weight of the slate" on the roof and Marie Lawrence won, guessing 32,400 pounds. That is 16 tons! While our building has been able to bear this weight for a very long time, we know that the structure of the building is literally bending under this burden. Of course, it will be hard for all of us to say goodbye to the slate that has sheltered us for so long; however, we must keep in mind that lightening the load that the building is holding (even with the solar panels) will help sustain the church structure and better protect the interior of the church from leaks. We hope that our building can experience the rest that Jesus promises all of us who are weary and are carrying heavy burdens.

We expect the work on the roof to begin in the first half of October — soon! We will need to live with some inconvenience and messiness while the roof is being replaced. As I learned from the last building project, the process of dismantling is messy and difficult to see in this place that is so sacred to us. But as Ecclesiastes tells us, *There is a time to break down and a time to build up.* We need to get through the breaking down in order to experience the newness of building up. We also hope to have a weekly update about what is happening with the building in our weekly eNews and on the website.

Please keep the workers and our beloved church in your prayers during this important time of renewal.

THE BUILDING HOPE CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

We have been so deeply moved by the generosity of our church community in our effort to raise \$800,000 that will cover the replacement of all the roofs, the addition of heat/cool saving insulation, the installation of solar panels, and the electrification of the church and rectory through heat pumps. So far, we have received 29 pledges and raised \$704,700 towards our goal! We are hoping to receive 100 pledges and \$800,00 by October 9. If you have not had a chance to pledge yet, we sincerely hope that you will be moved to be a part of this important and inspiring project.



CURATE'S CORNER MUSINGS FROM YOUR RESIDENT ITINERANT

Amidst some pockets of pure recreation like a first pontoon ride on the Mississippi River, my summer was also one of immersion in other parts of my life of ministry — a bit of writing, facilitating a day of formation for a handful of congregations in Minnesota, spiritual companionship with intentional communities, and beginning to get to know our larger diocese.

Through all this, Paul's image of the Body of Christ (1 Cor 12:12–27) has emerged as a guiding image for this year of ministry and reflection that is now underway. The body has many members, says Paul. The foot cannot say, 'Because I am not a hand I do not belong.' However, neither can the eye say to the hand, 'I have no need of you' because you are not like me. Most of us understand what Paul is saying as a mental concept. But how truly do we get to experience it viscerally as we participate in the life of the church? Especially for those of us in thriving contexts, I think the answer is 'not very often.'

So I consider myself pretty lucky that my work allows engagement with so wide a swath of this Body's members — the many forms that 'church' takes broadly in this time as well as the many groanings of ministry within our particular diocese. Alongside that great privilege, I also feel a sense of excitement and responsibility to share little glimpses of that within our parish community in this space from time to time.

Even in the midst of our many vibrant initiatives here at St. Michael's, we are invited to remember that we don't belong to ourselves alone. Our missional life shows that we know the world needs us. But our diocese and the larger church have need of us. This is our most immediate body. We, too, have need of others: the new expressions that remind us what this is all about and all those small grains of wheat in the diocese and church around us — parishes of twenty... ten... six... just up the road who appear to be falling into the ground and dying, yet all so that the harvest of God may continue.

There are so many other experiments I'm already learning about in the body of DioVermont. I hope that as I continue to listen, learn, and experiment, some of you will also feel called to join in discovering what may be received, and what we are called to offer, by being even more fully connected with our fellow members.




DANIEL DOBSON'S SUPPORT FOR REFUGEE MINISTRY

As many of you know, Daniel was instrumental in bringing the refugee ministry to St Michael's. Even as his life moved toward its close, he continued and restated his commitment to both. It had been his desire to leave a legacy gift for that purpose. His daughter, Ann Dobson, understood his interest and carried out his wishes with a \$30,000 gift to the Refugee Ministry from his estate. The gift is surely from Daniel, but Ann deserves recognition for following through with his desire. In his honor we have named the project the Dobson Refugee Ministry and the supporting fund is now The Dobson Refugee Ministry Fund.

This gift is both an opportunity and challenge to the Refugee Ministry. The opportunity is clear—the gift enhances substantially the resources available to carry the ministry forward. The challenge is that the gift also puts before us the need to take seriously the level of commitment Daniel had to the work and continue to honor and match it.

We are thrilled by both the opportunity and the challenge aspects of this gift and for the memory Daniel leaves of himself with us. We remember him fondly and treasure the time he was with us as much as the work left behind for us to continue.







DON'T FORGET TO SIGN UP FOR SHELTER MEALS MINISTRY

The new Groundworks Shelter is open again on South Main St. in Brattleboro, and the parishioners of St. Michael's are once again invited to participate in providing meals to the homeless men and women of Brattleboro who stay there. Benson Bobrick and Liz Vick will be coordinating the enterprise and will arrange for the prepared food, hot or cold (as it will be served), to be picked up from parishioners in the St. Michael's parking lot and delivered to staff at the Shelter.

As we did last year, we will be providing a full dinner to the Shelter for 34 on the 2nd Monday of each month, from October through April. Volunteers will prepare their own chosen part of the meal at home: a pasta or lasagna dish; a salad with dressing; a dessert; bread & butter; milk. The milk, of course, can be purchased. The bread can be home-made or purchased, as well as the dessert. Please feel free to team up with someone else for the main dish so each makes half.

For those who need them, we will have disposable pans or containers available in a storage closet in the church kitchen. It is best not to use your own pots or pans in delivering the food, as they will be hard to retrieve. Our Monday dates for the coming 7 months will be: Oct. 10, Nov. 14, Dec. 12, Jan. 9, Feb. 13, Mar. 13, and Apr. 10. If you have any questions, please call or email Benson or Liz. SUMMARY OF SEPTEMBER MEETING OF THE VESTRY

The September meeting of St. Michael's Vestry opened, as our meetings always do, with prayer, reflection and discussion, this time led by Rosie Wojcik. Prompted by the passing of Queen Elizabeth and focused on the importance of making space for truth telling, Rosie asked us to consider "How do we react to loss of a known power structure even if flawed?" The prompt Rosie shared is this remarkable poem by Leslé Honoré that sparked pithy dialogue.

"May the winds of independence blow over all Black nations colonized by the monarchy"

We heard Treasurer Bruce Lawrence's report on August income, expense, and pledge performance which, given that we are 66% through the fiscal — and calendar — year, shows us on track with projections overall. Bruce also presented the auditors' report which was approved by the Vestry.

In the Rector's Report, Mary noted that Horizon Preschool is now renting both the Nursery and the Sunday School rooms upstairs in addition to their downstairs spaces. Horizon did a fine job of redoing and preparing the rooms, Mary notes. The Parish will still use these rooms on Sundays and, perhaps, at other times when a Parish event warrants the offering of child care. A new rental contract was presented to the Vestry and approved. The added rental will bring another \$1000 a month for the Parish.

Mary expressed appreciation for the Vestry's hard work both for the picnic at the generous McGinns' place on Spofford Lake and with the Building Hope Open House. She also noted that the Season of Creation — a time for people of faith to renew their relationship with God and all creation through celebration, prayer, and action — runs formally through October 9, though its spirit will endure. In addition, she noted the upcoming Winged Production's presentation of Michael, a music/theatre/puppetry production that explores the epic story of St. Michael.

Performances are Friday and Saturday Sept. 30 and Oct. 1 at 7:30 and Sunday Oct. 2 at 4 pm.

Finally, Mary reported that changes in the structure of the Diocese of Vermont are in the offing. Named the Thrive initiative, it is focused on reorganizing and downsizing while making best use of resources in light of decreasing assets.

In the Warden's Report, I noted that we'll be starting work soon on the revamping of the Common Room — a space in which it's intended that we display the history of St. Michael's including its relationship to Bishop Hopkins — redo the photo walls, allow space for updates on current projects such as Building for Hope and, in general, create a warm and welcoming feeling for all who enter. We could use some design and writing help for this project. If interested, please contact me or Mary. Due to absences, we didn't receive a report on the September Vestry Listening Corner but



one Vestry member recounted good feedback/input she'd received from a parishioner on the Building Hope project. It's important that parishioners know that they can contact any Vestry member with a concern or question. Our names and contact info appear at the end of this publication. I also reported that, starting in this issue, we'll print a write up each month of one of St. Michael's many ministries and initiatives, not only to keep the Parish posted on who's doing what, but also, it's hoped, to spark interest in your perhaps becoming involved in a particular realm.

Under Committee Reports, Mary reported that the Capital Campaign is going well. Brochures and pledge cards have been sent and \$690K of the \$800K goal has been pledged by 27 individuals as of this writing. The aim is 100 pledges. Alan reported new developments in the project one of which is Ron Bell's analysis showing that all roofs can structurally bear solar panels. Mary has met with contractors regarding anticipated impact of the project on the nursery school and on parish life as a whole. Alan added that the Building and Grounds committee will be putting up temporary fencing in the Rectory yard for nursery school play space and it was assured that Phoenix Roofing will wrap all work up at the end of each week to ensure a safe campus for Sunday worship. Phoenix will start work on the new roof by mid-October.

Steven began the report on the refugee ministry by saying that unexpected circumstance has necessitated his stepping back from the ministry's work. All thanked him. Nancy, who has stepped into the leadership position left by the unfortunate passing of Daniel Dobson, reported that the Ministry's work is going well. A volunteer recognition event will be held September 22 and it's noted that the vast majority of volunteers in the Brattleboro area are from St. Michael's. The learning yielded by

engagement with our refugee families is vast, Nancy reports. For a number of reasons, each family is quite different; each warrants individualized attention. Many are struggling with limited resources, she adds. "It's an up front and personal look at what it is to be poor." "America is hard," one of our family's men said. "This is an inside view of struggle," Nancy adds. "We operate with a lot of faith."

David then reported on the Mission and Outreach Committee's work noting the ongoing aid and support we give to the Haitian orphanage outside of which, as of this writing, conditions are horrific. The Mission and Outreach ministry welcomes input from parishioners to guide their work toward similar entities — home and abroad — in need of funding, volunteers, or both.

Upcoming. The Blessing of the Animals will be October 9, Darcey Mercier and Susan Nichols will wed October 22, and October 30 will be the All-Saint's Day service.

Steve closed our time together with this 16th century prayer:

God be in my head — and in my understanding
God be in my eyes — and in my looking
God be in my mouth — and in my speaking
God be in my heart — and in my thinking
God be at my end — and in my departing.
