
THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

The Presider praises God for God's creation and love. Then all sing the Sanctus together:

Invitation to Receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion

At St. Michael's, we believe that God's love is unconditional. We welcome all people and we affirm the worth, dignity, and gifts of every person as a beloved child of God. In our celebration of the Eucharist, there is no one here who is ineligible or unwelcome; no one who has too many doubts or too few beliefs. This is the table of a loving God set for all creation through the power of Jesus Christ.

You, who are part of that creation, are welcome.

Gluten-free wafers and grape juice are available. If you would like either, please indicate that preference to the liturgical minister.

Receive the Bread in your open palm followed by the Common Cup, taking the cup by its base and guiding it to your lips. You may also receive the Bread only, with arms folded over your chest afterwards. Or if you wish to come to the Altar for a blessing only, please fold your arms over your chest.

In the fall of 2000, I fled the chaos and stress of living in the midst of Washington, D.C.'s sprawling suburbs for the green and remote mountains—first of New Hampshire and then Dummerston, Vermont. My community became the woods and all of nature's beings, *and* St. Michael's Episcopal Church. I began attending late in the fall of 2000. Some of you may remember me from then when I was very involved in Centering Prayer (facilitating a Monday night group) and offering programs on greening the church, our lives, and voluntary simplicity. I also offered forums on nature-based prayer. After a hiatus while I completed my doctoral dissertation in eco-spirituality and then moved to Boulder, Colorado for a post-doctoral fellowship in Christian-Buddhist role models of ecological living and leadership, I returned to the

Brattleboro area and St. Michael's in 2012. After a career in higher education sustainability leadership, it has been a joy to work with Mary and the Vestry to bring this consciousness to our church home.

Today many of you may know of my work with the Building Hope for the Earth campaign. My passion is ecological spiritual formation, contemplative practice, personal/organizational discernment and how they weave together to create a just, equitable, and ecologically conscious community of hopeful action. I also loved being an active member of the Discernment for Laypeople Team when Duncan was here. I am so deeply touched by the courage the St. Michael's community has demonstrated with its commitment to reduce our fossil fuel use, choose renewables, and be a beacon of hope and leadership for the broader community.

You could say I experienced the Episcopal Church in many ways as the daughter of a priest and Air Force chaplain (former Priest Associate here, Father Hutchins, whom many may still remember). But our St. Michael's community, where I have been active since 1996, is closest to my heart. Items may be dropped off <u>inside</u> (please, not outside of) the 2 closets next to the childcare center (lower level door near the parking lot). The closets are labeled "Clothing and Linens" and "Housewares and Books" to help guide you. Masks encouraged inside the church building. **Please pay attention to our donation guidelines (as follows):**

Clothing- any season, adult and child. Must be clean, no stains or rips, good condition.

Shoes- any season, only lightly worn, excellent condition shoes, hiking boots, boots, sandals

<u>Iewelry</u>- in good condition.

Linens- good condition, no stains or rips, clean.

<u>Housewares</u>- must have all parts, clean, unbroken, in good condition. Small electric kitchen appliances (blenders, food processers, toasters) are fine if clean and in working order.

<u>Tovs</u>- only puzzles or games with all the pieces! Sorry, no other toys.

<u>Books</u>- books in good condition are welcome as long as they have not been stored in a damp basement. Children's and adult books welcome. **PLEASE**, **No Textbooks!**

<u>Furniture</u>- Please keep furniture at home until 2-4 weeks before the sale. We do not have storage space at this time. Upholstered furniture will need to be reviewed before accepting. Note: we cannot accept furniture made from particle board (fiber board).

Sports Equipment- Anything in really good cond. with all parts welcome, but please hold off until we are accepting furniture. Sporting goods are pretty bulky!

Sorry, we absolutely <u>cannot accept</u> any <u>AUDIO OR VISUAL ELECTRONICS</u>, <u>LARGE APPLIANCES</u>, <u>MATTRESSES</u>, <u>EXERCISE EQUIPMENT</u>, or anything that is soiled, worn, musty or broken.
