## COME & CHECK OUT ST. MICHAEL'S RENEWED COMMON ROOM!

The title "Common Room" says it all. This is the place where we walk through, visit, come together in informal ways, welcome people into our church. In 2021, when we engaged in deep study about the history and current realities of racism in the Episcopal Church, we learned more about Bishop John Henry Hopkins, the first bishop of Vermont whose portrait was prominently displayed in our Common Room, right on the other side of our sanctuary altar. Learning that Bishop Hopkins had written extensively supporting the cause of slavery, we really wanted to remove the portrait. Why do we have this visible reminder of our racist past in our Common Room?

We struggled with this decision. Take it down and make ourselves feel better, as if racism is a thing of the past? Leave it up as a reminder of our history and the work we are called to do? What we decided was to create a display of some important parts of our history — both the things we are proud of and the things we would rather hide.

Thanks to the very hard work of Chris Triebert, Annie Landenberger, Kim Peavey, adwoa Wilson, John Laamanen, Jeanie Crosby and our Building & Grounds crew of Alan McBean, Vince Johnson and Ross Kinney, we have finally finished the Common Room Project. We have created panels about our history, about our legacy and about how God is calling us today. Not only that, but we have new displays of parishioner photos and names, a new paint job and some new furniture. We hope that the Common Room will invite conversation, connection and welcome to all who spend time there. Come and check it out!

#### ALL SAINTS' DAY CELEBRATED ON SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 5

I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love toward all the saints, and for this reason I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers.

On November 5, St. Michael's will celebrate the Feast of All Saints at both the 8 am and the 10:15 am services. During these services, we will remember those saints who have gone before us and loved ones who have died, as well as recognize ourselves as those 'saints' who have been called to follow Jesus with our whole selves.

On this day, we will remember in our prayers those who have died during the last year.

- If you have people you would like to be named in the prayers, please add them to the book in the back of the church.
- If you have pictures of loved ones who have died whose lives you want to give thanks for, we will a table in front of the altar as a visible reminder of the saints who have come before us for worship that day.
- Because this is a major feast day, we will have incense at the 10:15 am service

## NOVEMBER ADULT FORUMS

- November 5 "St. Michael's Prison Ministry": For more than ten years, St. Michael's has had an outreach program to support the persons incarcerated at the state prison for southern Vermont. The program includes a worship service at the prison twice each month. Additional services and support are needed. We could expand our ministry to the prisoners with more volunteers. *Come hear Cliff Wood and Gabriel Sistare discuss what they are doing right now and what expanding this ministry might look like.*
- November 12 "The Heat Fund": Windham County residents who are struggling to pay for home heating fuel and who are not eligible for existing programs can contact The Windham County Heat Fund for help. Monies are given directly to fuel dealers and deposited into the accounts of people and families receiving donations. The Fund has no overhead and almost no administrative expenses; all money is used to pay fuel bills. *Richard Davis, one of the founders of the Heat Fund, will lead.*
- November 19 "Books that have changed your life": What is better than a good book? Let's share our collective knowledge! This will be an informal conversation about books that have changed our lives. You are invited to bring a book or two to share with the group. *Mary Lindquist facilitates*.
- November 26 "T'is the Season Gifts and gifting": What is a gift? How do we understand gifts as we head into the Christmas season? "The Gift" by Lewis Hyde explores the idea of gift in human experience. I read it in the 1980s and it completely reframed my understanding. Perhaps his ideas and our discussion will be helpful to you as we approach the annual Christmas gift exchange. *Facilitated by Annamarie Pluhar*.

#### **DIAPER SUNDAY IS NOVEMBER 26**

In one year, a typical baby uses about 2400 diapers costing up to \$950, an enormous impact on family budgets. Yet Federal safety net programs such as WIC and SNAP don't cover diapers. Children need regular diaper changes to prevent rashes and infections and to attend child care where they can grow socially and intellectually.

Every Tuesday and Friday, thanks to the generosity of our community, families in need go to Loaves and Fishes to receive a hot meal, groceries, and needed personal health items such as diapers. Foodworks in Brattleboro and Parks Place in Bellows Falls also supply donated diapers. All three of these great organizations have limited budgets, and they sometimes run out of diapers completely. Your donations of diapers are welcome in the offering basket at St. Michael's every week of the year. And twice a year, at Thanksgiving and Mother's Day, we highlight this need and express thankfulness for our own blessings by organizing a diaper drive.

Please bring a pack or box of disposable diapers (any size) or wipes to St. Michael's on Diaper Sunday, November 26, placing them in the front of the Sanctuary. Prior to that date, you may also leave

them on Brian and Joyce Vining Morgan's porch at 109 Wantastiquet Drive. Or any week in November, place a check to St. Michael's in the collection plate with the memo "Diaper Sunday," which the Outreach Committee will use for a bulk purchase of diapers. Your donations will be shared between Parks Place Diaper Bank in Bellows Falls and Foodworks and Loaves and Fishes in Brattleboro.
