

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,



Invitation to Receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion

At St. Michael's, we believe that God's love is unconditional. We welcome all people and we affirm the worth, dignity, and gifts of every person as a beloved child of God. In our celebration of the Eucharist, there is no one here who is ineligible or unwelcome; no one who has too many doubts or too few beliefs. This is the table of a loving God set for all creation through the power of Jesus Christ. You, who are part of that creation, are welcome.

Gluten-free wafers and grape juice are available. If you would like either, please indicate that preference to the liturgical minister.

Receive the Bread in your open palm followed by the Common Cup, taking the cup by its base and guiding it to your lips. You may also receive the Bread only, with arms folded over your chest afterwards. Or if you wish to come to the Altar for a blessing only, please fold your arms over your chest.

Following Communion, the congregation stands to say the final prayer:

ADULT FORUM THIS MORNING. 9-10 AM, MEETING ROOM:

• November 19: "Israel and Palestine: Context and Discussion" – The Adult Forum Committee has invited the Reverend Nicholas Porter, Founding Director of Jerusalem Peacebuilders (JPB), to facilitate a forum about the current situation in Israel and Palestine, as well as to address our questions. Jerusalem Peacebuilders is a ministry of interfaith reconciliation that partners with Jewish, Christian, and Muslim organizations to provide Israeli Jewish and Palestinian Arab educators and youth with the skills, relationships, and support they need to be effective agents of positive change. In 2011, JPB began with 11 participants. In 2022, JPB impacted 10,000 adults and youth.

DIAPER SUNDAY IS NOVEMBER 26: Every Tuesday and Friday, thanks to the generosity of our community, families in need go to Loaves and Fishes to receive a hot meal, groceries, and needed personal health items such as diapers. Foodworks in Brattleboro and Parks Place in Bellows Falls also supply donated diapers. All three of these great organizations have limited budgets, and they sometimes run out of diapers completely. Your donations of diapers are welcome in the offering basket at St. Michael's every

week of the year. And twice a year, at Thanksgiving and Mother's Day, we highlight this need and express thankfulness for our own blessings by organizing a diaper drive.

Please bring a pack or box of disposable diapers (any size) or wipes to St. Michael's on Diaper Sunday, November 26, placing them in the front of the Sanctuary. Prior to that date, you may also leave them on Brian and Joyce Vining Morgan's porch at 109 Wantastiquet Drive. Or any week in November, place a check to St. Michael's in the collection plate with the memo "Diaper Sunday," which the Outreach Committee will use for a bulk purchase of diapers. Your donations will be shared between Parks Place Diaper Bank in Bellows Falls and Foodworks and Loaves and Fishes in Brattleboro.

ST. MICHAEL'S REFUGEE MINISTRY UPDATE: Since we began this work in late 2021 we have received and co-sponsored 5 families, totaling 28 people. All our families are now on a path to stability with apartments and jobs, children in school and hopes for the future. Other refugees are now arriving in Brattleboro from other countries. 70 are currently in residence at SIT, the interim housing stop. The Ministry itself, led for over two years by Jean Smith and Jeff Lewis, along with Daniel Dobson and Nancy Ames, formed an Advisory Committee nearly a year ago to prepare for sustainability. The new leaders of the Ministry will be Elizabeth Fisher, Paul Gallagher and Robin Manning, with the Advisory Committee supporting them. They will be looking to form new teams to host families from the arriving refugees.

PRISON MINISTRY: We had a wonderful service on Sunday, Nov. 12, with twelve participating. The men especially enjoyed the music led by Ron Bos Lun, volunteer and teacher at the Compass School. A special thanks to the three persons who made donations which allowed us to purchase a nice array of much needed toiletries. Additional donations which would allow us to create holiday gift bags for the inmates would be appreciated. If you wish to make a monetary donation so that we can purchase these items in bulk, please indicate "prison ministry" when you send or bring your donation. Thank you for your continued support.

CARRY ME HOME NEEDS COATS AND MITTENS: Carry Me Home continues to give gently used clothes to refugees and others in need at our shop in the basement of Centre Congregational Church. Our biggest needs at present are:

PROJECT FEED THE THOUSANDS RUNS FROM NOVEMBER 1 THROUGH DECEMBER 31, 2023:

We need --

- Canned goods especially with pop top lids: baked beans, beans, canned chicken, tuna fish, deviled ham, hash, fruits, and vegetables, spaghetti sauce
- Dry goods: crackers, individual packets of rice and mashed potatoes, mac and cheese, pasta meals
- Afghan and other refugee food needs: rice, red beans, garbanzo beans, flour, oil, yeast, sugar
- And of course cash
