

ADULT FORUM SERIES: HOUSING AS COMMUNITY

April 14: Housing as Community: L'Arche — In 2019, Reverend Duncan Hilton, while serving at St. Michael's, spearheaded the initiative to explore the creation of a L'Arche community in Southern Vermont. Founded in France in 1964, L'Arche is now a worldwide network of over 150 communities where people with and without intellectual disabilities share life together, interdependently, and engage wholeheartedly with their wider community.

Today Duncan's vision to create a local L'Arche community continues. At the Forum, we will explore how we can foster a sense of belonging by strengthening human and social connections. Friends of L'Arche Southern Vermont believes that "people with intellectual disabilities belong at the center of

community, rather than its peripheries, that people of differing abilities are called into life together, and that we are all transformed when we commit to loving and serving each other."

April 21: Housing as Community: Windham Aging

— Windham Aging is a community collaboration focused on what 2040 will look like for the significant number of residents 60+. Please join Chris Hart to hear about the extensive housing needs that will grow with the population over the next 16 years and to share your thoughts about aging well in Windham County.

April 28: Housing as Community: Winston Prouty Campus — Chloe Learey, Executive Director of The Winston Prouty Center, will talk with the Forum about the evolving vision for housing on the Winston Prouty campus and give an update on the status of the project.

MOTHERS' DAY DIAPER SUNDAY IS MAY 12

Twice a year, at Thanksgiving and Mothers' Day, times when we are thankful for our own blessings, the Outreach Committee invites us to express our gratitude by donating diapers for our neighbors. In one year, a typical baby uses about 2400 diapers costing up to \$950, an enormous impact on family budgets. Yet Federal safety net programs such as WIC and SNAP don't cover diapers. Children need regular diaper changes to prevent rashes and infections and to attend child care where they can grow socially and intellectually.

Please bring a pack or box of disposable diapers (any size) or wipes to St. Michael's on Diaper Sunday, May 12, placing them in the front of the Sanctuary. Alternatively, place a check to St. Michael's in the collection plate with the memo "Diaper Sunday," which the Outreach Committee will use to purchase diapers in bulk. Your donations will be shared between Parks Place Diaper Bank in Bellows Falls, the Putney Foodshelf, and Foodworks and Loaves and Fishes in Brattleboro."



SWORDS TO PLOUGHSHARES, VERMONT HOSTS FIRST PUBLIC EVENT MAY 18

Following an introductory Swords-to-Plowshares event at Brattleboro's Retreat Farm last April, several area leaders have formed Swords to Plowshares, Vermont, Inc., which holds its first public event May 18 at the Putney School.

Since its founding in 2017, Swords to Plowshares (https://www.s2pnortheast.org/) has focused on reducing gun violence in communities. The group's purpose, according to its website, is founded on this: "With [45,000] gun deaths per year in our country, something must be done now. The strategy we apply to this problem is to convert weapons of death into

tools of life, and then use those tools to the betterment of the community."

Swords to Plowshares, Vermont (StPVt) is a Windham County chapter of the nonprofit organization dedicated to community education aimed at reducing gun violence. According to founder, Rt. Rev Thomas Ely, "working with the Windham County Sheriff's department, we are seeking unwanted firearms that can be destroyed and the usable parts turned into garden tools and works of art."

StPVt is currently working with Brian Quarrier, art teacher at The Putney School, whose students will create items out of the recycled weapons. "We are in need of donations of firearms so that the students can get to work," Ely adds.

The StPVt May 18 event will be from 10–12 at The Putney School, Houghton Brook Rd., Putney, Vt. Attendees will benefit from a presentation on StPVt's mission and its connection with local law enforcement and from a demonstration of the transformational process of turning unwanted firearms into garden tools and works of art by Putney School students. Attendees will have a chance to watch and share in the demonstration. People should arrive around 9:30 so that the program can begin on time. "There is a bit of a walk to the art center from the parking area," Ely adds. "And if you have firearms that you no longer have use for and would like to dispose of them in a safe way and, at the same time, know that the usable parts will be transformed into garden tools and works of art, then please email swordstoplowsharesvt@gmail.com."

HOUSING NEEDED FOR REFUGEE FAMILY

St. Michael's is currently supporting two refugee families. Team "Rinaldo" (name chosen by a young member of the family) is supporting a Congolese family who arrived in the United States in September. Following 20 years in a refugee camp in Uganda, they have been living at SIT while they get settled into school, employment, and life in the US.

We are now actively looking for an apartment or house to rent for the Pemba family. They are a family of 8; however, the two oldest sons are working and have an apartment of their own. So, we are seeking a rental that can accommodate a family of 6, either a large 3-bedroom or ideally a 4-bedroom apartment or house.

If something larger were available, the family might consider renting together as a family of 8. The Brattleboro area is preferable, secondary to transportation issues, but we would consider all options.

They are a very close and kind family, who would make excellent tenants. Three of the children are in high school (BUHS), joining in activities such as soccer, track and baseball. They look forward to going to college. The oldest, who completed college in Uganda, is currently seeking to obtain US college credit for his degree.

A MESSAGE ABOUT FOYER EVANGELIQUE UNIVERSEL ORPHANAGE

Note: This message was received from Pastor Duckens Janvier, founder and director of the orphanage, on March 13, 2024. St. Michael's has been a long-time supporter of this orphanage in Haiti.

"In spite of the resignation of the Prime Minister who had led the country very badly, the gangs are getting together to take over the presidential palace and install their own government; there are already American soldiers on the ground but they haven't reacted. The roads are still blocked after 15 days of ransacking public institutions and some private businesses. This situation has caused the prices of all products to rise; there are certain products that are sold for three times the initial price. There are also products that one can no longer find in the market, such as rice.

I have rented a house for the 15 girls, and the 16 boys are in another nearby location. But I have also provided housing for 13 families who left Meyer with me, who have nothing to eat and escaped with nothing but the clothes they were wearing on the day of our flight.

I live in a house near the children with my wife, but my own children are with my parents because I don't have enough space to house them. Thus, I have 31 young people with me, and more than 85 people whom I am sheltering at my school in Santo and the neighboring area. I have started to purchase a piece of land in Santo; if I had the money, I could construct some dormitory rooms in order to provide better housing for people. I continue to help people who are unemployed, who have abandoned their homes; if I don't give them something to eat, they may spend an entire day without eating anything; it is truly serious.

Happily, there is a large store only a kilometer away that has large supplies of products in bulk that help the whole community. I can buy enough supplies there to keep in reserve in case the situation becomes worse because the ports are closed and the routes for the circulation of certain products are blocked. Thanks to one person I know who works at the bank, I am able to pick up money at the bank by traveling more than 20 kilometers either to Delmas or Petionville because the banks near me have been ransacked and burned.

For the moment, there is only my personal bank account. Perhaps when the situation will have improved, I would be able to open an account in the name of OEFU or my church if I am able to find the papers that were left behind in Meyer.

Thank you... I continue to pray that I will be able to keep the young people of OFEU in safety, which is a huge responsibility for me, and also to find the means to continue to feed them, take care of their health needs, purchase clothes, etc. Thank you again."



SUMMARY OF THE MARCH 21 MEETING OF THE VESTRY

- Christine Hart called the meeting to order at 6:03 pm.
- Rosie Wojcik offered readings and encouraged discussion about ways to deal with news
 and events that seem out of control with actions that, while seem minor, are meaningful.
- Minutes of the February 18 meeting were approved with additions.
- Budget was reviewed with the new vestry members seeking clarification about the budget report. A training session will be considered. Several corrections regarding the pension contributions and outreach budget were identified and will be addressed by the Treasurer.
- Mary Lindquist presented the Rector's report:
 - Regarding stewardship, John Lent has agreed to chair the effort again and will
 present a plan at the Vestry Meeting in May.
 - Choir gathering will occur on Saturday, March 23 to discuss changes and develop a vision for the future.
 - Mary will be on vacation from April 22 through May 6.
- Skyberry House, a vision which resulted from the "Responding to our Neighbors" initiative was presented by Teresa Savel and Susan Heimer.
- Its mission is to "create a home of hospitality where unhoused children and families feel supported and can grow and move forward in their lives."

- They asked if St. Michael's could act as fiscal agent to receive donations. In an extensive discussion, several questions were raised to be addressed by the organization's committee.
- In the Warden's report, Christine Hart mentioned that an effort will be made to increase awareness of the activities of the Diocese.
- In the Junior Warden's report, Susan Heimer shared the schedule for committee liaison reports during the 2024 Vestry meetings.
 - She offered two dates for the summer picnic at Spofford Lake and the Vestry agreed on Sunday, August 25.
- Committee reports
 - Building Hope: Cary Gaunt reported that the solar panels are fully functional with very high power generation on a sunny day in March.
 - Refugee Ministry: Paul Gallagher reported that second co-sponsorship team in 2024 has begun supporting a refugee family, a mother and five children from the Congo. Now with two new families needing cars, a notice will be circulated that St. Michael's can accept vehicles as a donation.
 - Mary reported that the Women's Retreat, held on February 24 at Hallelujah Farm, was highly successful.
 - Building and Grounds submitted an estimate, which was approved by the Vestry, to trim trees and shrubs.
- In other business, Mary reported that Tom Ely and Cliff Wood asked if St. Michael's could help Swords and Plowshares while it seeks to establish a Vermont chapter as a 501c3.
 - The Vestry approved a motion that St. Michael's can receive donations designated to support the mission of the Swords and Plowshares Ministry.
- David Treadwell offered a closing prayer devoted to our unhoused neighbors.
- The meeting adjourned at 8:18 pm.
