

Following the Peace, the Celebrant recites a sentence from Holy Scripture; all prepare for the Holy Eucharist.




Lift up your hearts.

TODAY IS ST. MICHAEL'S FEAST DAY: We are celebrating St. Michael the Archangel's Feast Day this morning. September 29 is the actual day appointed for this feast, which falls also in the Season of Creation. We will have incense at the 10:15 am service.

THE SEASON OF CREATION: This fall, St. Michael's joins with millions of Christians around the world to celebrate, for the second year, the Season of Creation. The movement, which began in the Eastern Orthodox Church and spread widely among Protestant, Catholic and Anglican congregations, is observed every year from September 1-October 4 (St. Francis' feast day, which will be celebrated on Sunday, October 6 at St. Michael's).

In our Sunday liturgy during this season, we integrate prayers, readings, music, sermons and a Eucharistic Prayer that reflect our love of God's creation, incorporating our grief, repentance and renewed commitment, with God's grace, to work for the healing of our earth. We hope you will join us for this special season!

Please note that the version of the Lord's Prayer we are using for this season is from the New Zealand Book of Common Prayer; the Profession of Faith is from South India and the Eucharistic Prayer was compiled by Nina Ranadive Pooley using sources from the Anglican church in South Africa and a Creation Eucharist written by Sam Wells.

ADULT FORUM TODAY: The Adult Forums are held each Sunday morning from 9 - 10 in the Meeting Room.

- Today, September 29 -- Climate Change and Justice: As a part of our Season of Creation reflection, Fred Taylor will lead this Forum focusing on the relation between climate change and issues of justice. Fred, a Keene State College professor of Environmental Studies with a focus on Environmental Ethics and Sustainability, is also the Vermont United Church of Christ environmental representative on the Justice and Witness Ministries group. With Fred, we'll examine the views of several African-American environmental leaders and how they analyze the impacts of climate change on their communities. We'll then see how their visions can be a guide for all of us to find a hopeful path into the future.
- Sunday October 6 -- "Walking The Little Way Together: Treading Gently In Community" -- In this Forum, our guest preacher, Brother John Michael Longworth, will share stories from his 14 years of being a member of the Order of Ecumenical Franciscans.

BEGINS THIS WEDNESDAY: Wednesday evenings October 2 through November 13, from 5:30-7pm, St. Michael's will offer a class on Centering Prayer for beginners and experienced practitioners alike. Given that many of us will be experiencing more stress and anxiety this fall with the presidential election, we invite you to "find an anchor in the storm" through opening to the presence of God and through being supported by the presence of one another in community. Each session will involve teaching, practicing and sharing. One recommended resource you may want to purchase is Cynthia Bourgeault's Centering Prayer and Inner Awakening. "PRAYING THROUGH CINEMA" BEGINS THIS THURSDAY: Facilitator Gabriel Sistare, says "One of my favorite activities is going to the movies by myself, choosing a film that will leave me a little spiritually woozy when I leave. I've spent plenty of time fine-tuning my YouTube algorithm to feed video essay after video essay on film analysis. So, through these activities I've learned there is plenty to investigate about spirituality as expressed through 'the big screen.' I am curious to see who at St. Michael's and our local community may want to join a group that wanders through spirituality in film for 6-8 weeks. We will watch full films in between meetings and discuss the films in person along with viewing clips and video essays. Discussions will broadly ask how we

attempt to relate with God through film or as film portrays that relationship.
