

On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

*Celebrant* Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being?

May Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has given us a new birth by water and the Holy Spirit, and bestowed upon us the forgiveness of sins, keep us in eternal life by his grace, in Christ Jesus our Lord. *Amen.*

### OFFERING



The Presider asks the Holy Spirit to consecrate the bread and the wine to be God's holy food.


And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

# Invitation to Receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion

At St. Michael's, we believe that God's love is unconditional. We welcome all people and we affirm the worth, dignity, and gifts of every person as a beloved child of God. In our celebration of the Eucharist, there is no one here who is ineligible or unwelcome; no one who has too many doubts or too few beliefs. This is the table of a loving God set for all creation through the power of Jesus Christ.

You, who are part of that creation, are welcome.

Gluten-free wafers and grape juice are available. If you would like either, please indicate that preference to the liturgical minister.

Receive the Bread in your open palm followed by the Common Cup, taking the cup by its base and guiding it to your lips. You may also receive the Bread only, with arms folded over your chest afterwards. Or if you wish to come to the Altar for a blessing only, please fold your arms over your chest.

### POSTCOMMUNION PRAYER

Loving God, we give you thanks for restoring us in your image and nourishing us with spiritual food in the Sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood. Now send us forth a people, forgiven, healed, renewed; that we may proclaim your love to the world and continue in the risen life of Christ our Savior. Amen.

**ADULT FORUM TODAY**: The Forum meets on Sunday morning from 9-10 in the Meeting Room. All are welcome to join in.

• Today January 12, "Baptism: Roots and Wings": Baptism is both the Church's ancient rite of initiation and a key theological construct for our understanding of ministry today. This Forum will explore the historical roots of Baptism and the ways in which our understanding of Baptism and Baptismal Ministry has evolved and informs our current understanding of the Ministry of All the Baptized. We will explore the current liturgy, and some of the ongoing, sometimes controversial, conversations about Baptism and expansion of the Baptismal Covenant.
