


OFFERING

Invitation to Receive Holy Communion

At St. Michael's, we believe that God's love is unconditional. We welcome all people and we affirm the worth, dignity, and gifts of every person as a beloved child of God. In our celebration of the Eucharist, there is no one here who is ineligible or unwelcome; no one who has too many doubts or too few beliefs. This is the table of a loving God set for all creation through the power of Jesus Christ. You, who are part of that creation, are welcome.

Gluten-free wafers and grape juice are available. If you would like either, please indicate that preference to the liturgical minister.

Receive the Bread in your open palm followed by the Common Cup, taking the cup by its base and guiding it to your lips. You may also receive the Bread only, with arms folded over your chest afterwards. Or if you wish to come to the Altar for a blessing only, please fold your arms over your chest.

The Forum meets on Sunday morning from 9-10 in the Meeting Room. All are welcome to join in the learning opportunity.

• TODAY: "WHAT ABOUT AN ELDERS MINISTRY AT ST MICHAEL'S?" In this Forum, we will introduce the idea of an Elders Ministry at St Michael's to build stronger support networks, share our experience and knowledge of community resources, and help us be better prepared for the various challenges of old age. Our purpose is to help each other attend to our aging, trying to make this stage of our lives more intentional and proactive. We will briefly point to prior and current initiatives at St Michael's, which prompt our interest and canvass attendees on their interests and concerns. Conveners are Evangelina Holvino, Jeffrey Lewis, Jane Sbardella, and MJ Woodburn.

In May, we'll have a series of three fora led by Saint Michael's Path for Creation Justice Team, beginning with:

• MAY 4: "EVERYTHING YOU ALWAYS WANTED TO KNOW ABOUT SUSTAINABLE WASTE MANAGEMENT." What, exactly, happens to the plastic, paper, aluminum and other materials we faithfully place in our recycling bins, week after week, after they are carted away by the county? What about the food waste that we throw into our composting bins? What are the best practices regarding how and what we, as organizations and individual households, collect to send to our waste management facilities? On May 4th, Bob Spencer, Executive Director of the Windham Solid Waste Management District, will join us to answer all these questions and more.

RESPONDING IN FAITH

SWORDS TO PLOWSHARES EVENT Swords to Plowshares Vermont will hold a special public educational and demonstration event on Sunday **May 4, 2025**, from 12-3 PM, on the grounds of Saint Michael's Episcopal Church.

Swords to Plowshares, Vermont is a Windham County-based nonprofit organization dedicated to gun safety and gun violence education. Working closely with the Windham County Sheriff's Office and the Brattleboro Police Department, Swords to Plowshares, Vermont offers a way for individuals to safely dispose of unwanted firearms which are then transformed into garden tools, jewelry, and artwork by blacksmith artists, among them students from the Putney School.

The May 4 th event will feature a live demonstration of the process for transforming unwanted firearms into garden tools. Attendees will also have a chance to take part in the transformational process themselves, wielding a blacksmith's hammer. Free gun safety locks, courtesy of the Windham County Sheriff's Department, will also be available, along with literature about safe gun storage.

Tom Ely, Ann Ely, and Cliff Wood from Saint Michael's all serve on the Swords to Plowshares, Vermont Board, and welcome you to this free public event. Rain or Shine!
