Following the Lesson...


Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people **Thanks be to God.** 2 Kings 5: 1-14

THE NICENE CREED

Luke 10: 1-11, 16-20

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and became truly human.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified. who has spoken through the Prophets.
We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.
We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.
We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen

WE PRAY FOR GOD'S CREATION, FOR THE WORLD, AND FOR THE CHURCH

A form for the intercessions is announced.

The prayers conclude with a form of "General Confession" said by the community, with the Deacon or Presider saying: Leader: Let us confess our sins to God.

After a period of silence, all say together: God of all mercy, we confess that we have sinned against you, opposing your will in our lives. We have denied your goodness in each other, in ourselves, and in the world you have created. We repent of the evil that enslaves us, the evil we have done, and the evil done on our behalf. Forgive, restore, and strengthen us through our Savior Jesus Christ, that we may abide in your love and serve only your will. Amen.

ABSOLUTION

Presider: Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through the grace of Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. **Amen**.

THE PEACE The Peace of Christ be always with you. And also with you.

The people remain standing. The Presider faces them and says,


Presider	God be with you.



Invitation to Receive Holy Communion

At St. Michael's, we believe that God's love is unconditional. We welcome all people and we affirm the worth, dignity, and gifts of every person as a beloved child of God. In our celebration of the Eucharist, there is no one here who is ineligible or unwelcome; no one who has too many doubts or too few beliefs. This is the table of a loving God set for all creation through the power of Jesus Christ. You, who are part of that creation, are welcome.

Gluten-free wafers and grape juice are available. If you would like either, please indicate that preference to the liturgical minister. Receive the Bread in your open palm followed by the Common Cup, taking the cup by its base and guiding it to your lips. You may also receive the Bread only, with arms folded over your chest afterwards. Or if you wish to come to the Altar for a blessing only, please fold your arms over your chest.

No matter where you are in your spiritual journey, you are invited to come forward to share in communion or a blessing.

After all have received Communion there is a period of silence. Then the Presider says ...

WE ARE SENT AND GO FORTH INTO THE WORLD

Let us pray. God of abundance, you have fed us with the bread of life and cup of salvation; you have united us with Christ and one another; and you have made us one with all your people in heaven and on earth. Now send us forth in the power of your Spirit, that we may proclaim your redeeming love to the world and continue for ever in the risen life of Christ our Savior. Amen

Braiding a New Life: From Ghana to the Green Mountains

"Braiding A New Life" is a love letter to Brattleboro, Vermont, and a passionate portrait of reciprocity, mutual aid, and the value of cross-cultural friendships and diverse community. This 36-minute documentary follows Sarah, a Ghanaian asylum seeker, as she navigates life in Southern Vermont. We are with Sarah as she learns to drive with the help of a local volunteer, braids her friend Dora's hair, chats on

the local radio station, listens to a Congolese refugee band at a house concert, shops at an African grocery in Springfield MA, and prepares for her asylum case hearing with the support the Community Asylum Seekers Project (CASP). Above all, this is a portrait of four women — who together weave a shining net of support, advocacy, humor, ferocity, tenderness, and care — in their relationship to one another and in commitment to a world in which immigrants are welcomed, valued and respected. CASP is a locallyfounded organization that works to assist asylum seekers in sourcing basic needs, along with applying for work permits and navigating the asylum process.

He will be offering a **six-week grief support group** for parishioners of St. Michael's who are grieving the death of a loved one.
