SEASON OF CREATION READING: WEEK 4

"What is a charitable heart? It is a heart burning with love for the whole of creation, for humans, for the birds, for the beasts, for the demons—for all creatures. One who has such a heart cannot see or call to mind a creature without having eyes being filled with tears by reason of the immense compassion which seizes the heart; a heart which is softened and can no longer bear to see or learn from others of any suffering, even the smallest pain, being inflicted on any creature. That is why such a person never ceases to pray also for the animals, that they may be preserved and purified. This person will even pray for the reptiles, moved by the infinite pity which reigns in the hearts of those who are becoming united with God". (St. Isaac the Syrian, 7th-century Syriac Christian bishop and theologian best remembered for his written works on Christian asceticism.)

CATECHUMENATE, CONFIRMATION AND RENEWAL OF BAPTISMAL VOWS – This year, St. Michael's has four adult and teen candidates for baptism. Training and instruction leading up to the sacrament of baptism for adults is called the *catechumenate*. The catechumens will be meeting on the **second and fourth Saturdays of the month at 4pm** to begin a process of training and instruction in Christian understandings about God, human relationships and life in Christ that will culminate, if desired, in baptism at the Easter Vigil on Saturday, April 4, 2026 at the Great Vigil of Easter.

This class is also open to people who would like renew their baptismal vows, be confirmed or received when the Bishop of Vermont will visit St. Michael's on Sunday, April 26, 2026. This class is not a prerequisite for Confirmation or baptismal renewal, but is offered for those who desire to be part of this deep time of preparation and reflection over the next seven months. ST. MICHAEL'S FEAST DAY, NEXT SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 28: We will be celebrating St. Michael, the Archangel's, Feast Day next Sunday! September 29 is the actual day appointed for this feast, which falls also in the Season of Creation. We will have incense at the 10:15 am service.

ACLU FORUM: "WHAT TO DO IF ICE COMES TO CHURCH"

As many parishioners know, the Diocese of Vermont in April announced that it is committed to creating a sanctuary diocese that will welcome and protect the rights of all regardless of a person's immigration status. As part of this directive, we are sponsoring an event by the ACLU on **September 30 from 6:30-8:30 pm** on "What to do if ICE comes to our Church" and inviting other faith communities to join us in learning more. We are also supporting refugees and immigrants by handing out business cards created by Indivisible that allow people to report an ICE event that they see by scanning a QR code or using a URL on the card. This takes you to a page in which you can report all the information you see. The trained local Rapid Response team reviews these submissions and

investigates and, if there is an ICE presence and someone is detained, they will report it to Migrant Justice for legal help. These cards are on a table in the Community Room. Please feel to take one for yourself and/or for others who might be interested.
