SEASON OF CREATION READING: WEEK 6

Franciscan spirituality emphasizes a real equivalence and mutuality between the one who sees and what can be seen. There is a symbiosis between the mind and heart of the seer—and to what they will then pay attention. Francis had a unique ability to call others—animals, planets and elements—"brother" and "sister" because he himself was a little brother. He granted other beings and things mutuality, subjectivity, "personhood," and dignity because he first honored his own dignity as a son of God.

(Although it could be the other way around too!) The world of things was a transparent two-way mirror for him, which some of us would call a fully "sacramental" universe.

All being can correctly and rightly be spoken of with "one voice" (univocity), as John Duns Scotus will later put it (see chapter thirteen). What I am you also are, and so is the world. Creation is one giant symphony of mutual sympathy.

Or, as Augustine loved to say, "In the end there will only be Christ loving himself."

ADULT FORUM

We meet each week from 9-10 AM in the Meeting Room.

- October 5: What is Franciscan Discernment?, with John Michael Longworth.
 - Discernment is the art of contemplative listening that helps us to know which way to go. It's more than thinking, choosing, or deciding a preference, but rather involves careful attention to how the wisdom of God is arising within, around, and between us.
 - Many Christian communities have tools and methods that they use for this work. Today we'll look at two related methods from the Franciscan tradition that help members of that spiritual community answer the question that Francis gave us during his passing from life into life eternal, "What is mine to do?"
 - Contemplation, or what Richard Rohr, OFM calls "the long, loving look at the real" is a deeply embodied and incarnate form of abiding with God and with the rest of creation. It stands at the heart of our movement into the world.
 - We'll explore the cycle of Contemplation, Loving Action, Practice Reflection as well as a version of this process that comes from St. Clare of Assisi in her poem "Mirror of Eternity."
- October 12: Stories from the Field: St. Michael's work with refugee students in 2025. When World Learning welcomed 85 refugee students who had received scholarships to American colleges and universities, many St. Michael's parishioners volunteered to be local sponsors for the young people acclimating to life in the USA. During this forum we will share stories and reflect on these profound experiences of friendship and love across cultures.

GUEST PREACHER / PRESENTER FOR ST. FRANCIS' FEAST DAY

In celebration of St. Francis Day and the end of the Season of Creation, we welcome Brother John Michael Longworth a resident of Rutland and a member of St. Michael's Church in the Cloud, as our preacher and Adult Forum presenter this morning.

Br. John Michael Longworth, OEF is a life professed member of the Order of Ecumenical Franciscans. He entered formation for community life in 2010 and made vows of life profession in 2014, celebrating 10 years of vowed life this June. John Michael has served as a community interviewer, compiling the first volume of OEF local ministries in 2013, as well as the Scribe for 3 years, and the Formation Coordinator for 6 years.

Franciscan spirituality is a rhythm of going from Gospel to Life and Life to Gospel, which Br. John Michael does through service to the unhoused community in Chittenden County Vermont, and as a Spiritual Director and Formation Companion. This work is sustained by a personal and corporate contemplative prayer practice that is always growing and evolving.
