

NICENE CREED

THE OFFERING



BREAD AND WINE ARE SHARED

Invitation to Receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion

At St. Michael's, we believe that God's love is unconditional. We welcome all people and we affirm the worth, dignity, and gifts of every person as a beloved child of God. In our celebration of the Eucharist, there is no one here who is ineligible or unwelcome; no one who has too many doubts or too few beliefs. This is the table of a loving God set for all creation through the power of Jesus Christ. You, who are part of that creation, are welcome.

Gluten-free wafers and grape juice are available. If you would like either, please indicate that preference to the liturgical minister.

Receive the Bread in your open palm followed by the Common Cup, taking the cup by its base and guiding it to your lips. You may also receive the Bread only, with arms folded over your chest afterwards. Or if you wish to come to the Altar for a blessing only, please fold your arms over your chest.

Following Communion, the congregation stands to say the final prayer:

POSTCOMMUNION PRAYER

Blessed are you, O God, for you have visited and redeemed your people, coming to us in Jesus. With this meal and your love you have set us free to live in the light of a manger. Send us now into the world in peace, and grant us strength and courage to love and serve you with gladness and singleness of heart; through Christ our savior. Amen.

ADULT FORUM: The Forum meets on Sunday morning from 9-10 in the Meeting Room. All are welcome to join in.

- January 4: Sharing our Practices To celebrate the New Year, Mary Lindquist will facilitate a conversation about practices we engage in that help us feel grounded, close to God and/or close to one another. What has worked well for you? What has not worked? What would you like to try? Please be prepared to share your experiences and your stories.

Compline is a service of the Divine Office that takes place at the end of the day before going to bed. 20 minutes and will continue on the second Thursday of each month at 7:30pm until the summer. Come end your day with this ancient contemplative service

CIA – COMPASSION IN ACTION TEAM GATHERING Sunday, January 11 during Coffee Hour

A new ministry is forming around concrete, practical and time-limited offerings of Compassion in Action, or CIA. Past examples of this are the Advent collections of food and clothing for people in need in our community, the diaper drive, the MLK Day of Service, the Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper Fundraiser, to name a few. We need not do what we have done in the past! We wonder about ideas that you might have? The hope is that small groups of folks team-up to organize one or two CIA offerings a year and thereby allow the congregation to participate in acts of compassion, or "praying by doing." SUNDAY, JANUARY 18, MLK SUNDAY

We are honored to welcome the Reverend Charles Wynder, Jr. (a friend of Cliff and Wylene Wood!) to be St. Michael's MLK preacher this year. Reverend Wynder is the Dean of Chapel & Spiritual Life and The Charles Dickey Faculty Chair for Religion and Ethics at St. Paul's School in Concord, New Hampshire. Prior to his position at St. Paul's School, he served on the Presiding Bishop's Staff of The Episcopal Church, where he worked to enhance the Episcopal Church's capacity for advocacy, witness, and engagement to advance social and racial justice.

Reverend Wynder earned his B.A. in political science at Syracuse University, where he attended on a four-year Army ROTC scholarship. A Truman Scholar, he earned a Juris Doctor degree at the University of Michigan Law School. He then served six years as an attorney in the U.S. Army Judge Advocate General's Corps. Rev. Wynder continued his public service as a Deputy Commonwealth's Attorney, executive director of a federally funded legal services program, and vice president of programs for the National Legal Aid & Defender Association. He served several years as an adjunct professor at Hampton University teaching Constitutional Law: Civil Rights & Divinity Liberties. Reverend Wynder earned his Master of Divinity Degree from the Episcopal Divinity School.

In addition to preaching at both services, Reverend Wynder will also lead the Adult Forum that day, on the subject "Where Do We Go in 2026: Chaos or Community?" See next week's eNews and bulletins for more detailed information
